Inaugural Session Of Acton Council On Monday Evening

rowing of money from the Bank of Montreal to meet current expenses until the taxes are collected was read and passed. The amount of borrowing was set at \$30,000.

The Clerk was instructed to subscribe for ten copies of the Municipal World.

A letter from Dr. Mather, Medical Officer of Health, reported a visit to Mrs. Smethurst's Nursing Home. He found the home clean and Mrs. Smethurst very capable and suggested that she be permitted to continue as in the past. He had supplied her with a new register. It was stated there were 51 births at this Nursing Home the past year.

Another letter from Dr. Mather was received regarding the post hospital care of a patient who had been treated in a sanatorium.

A letter from Baxter Laboratories asked the roadway on either side of their plant be plowed by the municipality. The street on the south side of the plant had been plowed regularly.

A resolution was passed authorizing the payment of the amounts requested by the School Board not to exceed the amount of their estimates and the Reeve and Treasurer to pay the debenture principal and interest as they become due.

Other resolutions were passed authorizing the payment of salaries to municipal employees as they become due. The rate of pay for A. Clifford was set at 85c per hour and A. Harrop truck driver at 75c per hour.

D. D. Harrop was appointed weed inspector for 1948.

Another resolution was passed authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to pay Cecil Gibbons and Grant Allan their salaries semi-monthly.

Another resolution was passed to pay the salary of E. E. Harrop at the rate of \$175.00 monthly and to reimburse Mr. Harrop for gasoline used in his car while on municipal business to the amount of \$50 for the year.

Payment of H. F. Holmes' salary was authorized on presentation of vouchers.

The Reeve and Treasurer were authorized to sign and pay all cheques and transact business with the Bank of Montreal.

Miss Waller was appointed as part-time stenographer in the Public Utilities office at a weekly salary of \$10 per week, the week to consist of 16 hours and extra time to be paid for at the rate of 60c per hour.

The Clerk was instructed to write the Department of Highways, making complaint about the sand that was being used on the highway through Acton.

Inquiry was also to be made of the Department regarding a warning light at the corner of Mill and Main Streets. Council adjourned at 11.30 p.m.

OBITUARY

MRS. THOMAS KENNY
Johnstown, N. Y.
Many of our readers will regret to learn of the death of a native of Acton, Mrs. Thos. Kenny, who has been a resident of Johnstown, N.Y. for the past fifty years. The following item appeared in the Johnstown, N.Y. paper of December 29th.

"Death claimed one of the city's well known women residents at 5.15 yesterday afternoon, when Mrs. Margaret Kenny, aged 74, widow of Thomas Kenny, 320 North Perry St., passed away at 'Resthaven', 34 South William St." She had been in failing health for some time. Born in Acton, Ontario, Canada, July 19, 1873, she came to Johnstown and spent over 50 years of her life here. She was a member of the First Methodist Church and attended services as long as her health permitted. The only survivor is a nephew, Malcolm Johnson of Waterford.

The funeral was held on Wednesday, December 31st when Rev. Frank J. Reid had charge of the service. Burial was in the Johnstown, N.Y. Cemetery.
