IVAN'S IN TERRIBLE WAY

As a result of a Moscow despatch an "Aviation" Russian family, in which every one works, has a monthly income of 1200 rubles, or \$200. Ivan, his wife and family, their late, must adjust on about \$90 a week.

Here, what Mrs. Ivan is faced with when she visits the Soviet equivalent of the Supermarket, to buy a week's groceries 1 lb. butter \$1.50, 7 quarts milk at 50¢ a quart, \$3.50, 1 doz. eggs \$2.50, 1 lb. coffee \$7.00, a 3 lb. roast of veal \$10.00, 1 lb. sugar \$1.20, total \$25.70. Before she even gets around to buying bread, bacon, vegetables, cooking fat, fruit or cereals. Should her family happen to be smokers, she can buy as many packs of 25 cigarettes she likes -- at \$1.20 pack. Heaven help them if they like a glass of beer; with their dinner -- beer is \$1.33 a bottle.

All this means that about once every Five-Year Plan she might save enough to buy one member of the family a pair of shoes at \$54; and every other Five-Year Plan there might be enough in the bank to get Ivan a suit at \$285.

The above are taken from prices fixed by the Soviet government at the time of its recent economic "reform." Comment is invited from Canadian communists, who sponsored petitions condemning our social system for allowing milk to rise from 16¢ to 18¢ a quart. -- The Printed Word.
