Fergus Thistles Trowned by Tanners by 11-4

Game Last Thursday Night Was Wide Open Hockey but Tanners Pitted the Rubber at Fergus Goal Unmercifully - Hit Out for Period After He Stopped One with His Head - Play Was Fast and Clean

Fergus Thistles were the victim of circumstances last Thursday night. Very grateful circumstances. They had two strikes on them before they came to bat. Fente singled them out to cool the ardor of the Tanners who two days previously had suffered an ignominious defeat to Georgetown. Which is saying a lot.

Have you ever attempted blocking a steam roller or maybe a fast freight? Can you picture the results? Then you are capable of imagining what happened to the Thistles, under the surveillance of the biggest crowd to yet pass the turnstiles.

The Tanners banged in eleven goals, the Thistles four. And the final bell heralded the most biting defeat Fergus have suffered since this semester's inception.

Setting a prodigious pace from the opening whistle the Tanners took an early lead and were never headed. At one point, in the second session, Gillespie threw in within one goal of Acton, but that was the closest they came to the top of the net.

It was an Un-Washed Contest. Contrary to reports emanating from Milton dealing with the rough house atmosphere hereabouts, the game was comparatively peaceful. Referee "Honey" Kuntz, a sharp lad with his blinkers, assumed all was quiet for the major portion of play and awarded only four penalties, three of them to Acton.

"Honey" didn't consider a little shakily swinging extra penalties. As long as the boys just showed and swung for air, they could remain an asset to their club. But interference wasn't cricket, as brother Hilson found out. Two issues in blood were salvaged peacefully by "Honey" another blonde tootler who frequently appears in the vicinity would have been thumping for Shanghai.
