Annual Report Shows Year's Work Devonshire I.O.D.E.

Following is the Secretary's report of activities of the past year of the Duke of Devonshire Chapter I.O.D.E., presented at a recent meeting by the Secretary, Mrs. C. Cook.

During the year we have held 10 monthly and 7 executive meetings in the homes of our members. We have a membership of 66 active members and 1 associate member. Death took our other associate member, Mrs. W. E. Smith, during the year. We have four new members. 52 letters and cards have been sent to members and 5 flowers to bereaved members.

To be of service to our community is one of our aims and, under this, educational work comes high. It is to further this that we have, during the past year, made our usual presentation of awards for essays and art to each grade of the Public School, given the \$5 award to the student in Grade 8 with the highest standing, given a \$25 scholarship to the student in grade 13 for highest general proficiency, and presented each room in the Public School with Union Jacks. We have placed I.O.D.E. calendars in each grade of the Public School and 16 rural schools and have given our usual Christmas parcel to our adopted school at Trout Creek.

Locally, we have also helped to check the clothing for British Flood Victims and at the chest X-ray clinic, catered to Christmas party and have placed a wreath on the cenotaph on Remembrance Day.

In being of service to others, we have sent used clothing to Poland, several cartons of new baby clothing to Britain, used clothing for England's flood victims and many food parcels to Britain. We are now holding showers of baby clothing for Britain.

We have given cash donations to the Lucy Morrison Memorial, Endowment Fund, Nasik Hospital (India), Navy League, Upper Canada Tract Society, Canadian Mothercraft Society, British and European Relief, Polish Relief, Seamen's Amenities Fund, National Shipping Fund, Children's Aid Society, Acton Band, Halton Musical Festival, Princess Elizabeth gift, and held a tag day for the Institute for the Blind.

For this work the finances were raised by fees, donations, a bazaar and tag days. Total receipts were \$657.96. We held a 31st birthday dinner at which our guest speaker was Mrs. McPaul and our annual officers' tea the officers of the Lakeside Chapter and teachers of the schools were guests.

We are very grateful to all our guest speakers who have made our meetings so interesting: Miss Isabel Anderson, Mr. Tom Watson, Mr. John Gray, Mr. Mac Aylsworth, Dr. Mather, Mr. C. F. Anderson and Miss Veldhuis. Our own members have added a great deal with their talks on current events, etc.

May we extend our sincere appreciation to these and to all who helped make our past year such a successful one: the staff and pupils of the schools, the Acton Fair Board, the Acton Free Press, Beardmore and Co., the Acton Council, and everyone who, in any way, helped us. May we especially thank Mr. Graham, our auditor; Mr. Gardiner, who made our bazaar posters; and Mr. A. Mason and Mr. E. Barr, both of whom helped so much with our overseas parcels. Also, we must not forget that an enthusiastic executive and membership are the basis of any society's success.
