The Sunday School Lesson
SUNDAY, MARCH 21st, 1948

THE KINGDOM OF GOD AMONG MEN

Golden Text: Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven.—Matt. 6: 10.

Lesson Text: Luke 4: 16-20; Mk. 4: 26-29; Luke 17: 20-21; Ho. 14: 7.

Exposition: I. Jesus' Love for the House of God, Luke 4: 16.

Jesus loved the home of His childhood, youth and young manhood. He longed to make known the way of life to His own townspeople. He had gained a reputation away from home; perhaps His townsmen would now listen to Him. He observed the Sabbath of His people, the seventh day Sabbath, that had not yet been done away by His death (Col. 2: 16-18) and the Lord's day substituted by His resurrection (Ac. 20: 7; Rev. 1: 10). On that day He could always be found in the synagogue (v. 16, of Luke 2: 46; Ac. 17: 2). The services of the synagogue were dull and mechanical, but it stood for the presence of God and the teaching of His word among the people. Moreover, it was where the people were to be found and helped (Jno. 18: 20). In the synagogue He "stood up to read."

II. Jesus' love for the word of God and Familiarity with It, 17-20.

The roll of Isaiah was placed in His hands. He was familiar with it from end to end, and knew just where to turn. He began reading in the first verse of the sixty-fourth chapter (see also Isa. 57: 6, 35: 5). A wonderful vision of the coming one, Isaiah had had more than seven hundred years before. He had seen an "anointed" one or Christ—Isaiah or Messiah (Hebrew). By applying it to Himself Jesus proclaimed Himself the Christ, but it is doubtful if they understood Him. His hearers though must have been startled to hear the carpenter boy who had been brought up in their midst proclaiming Himself as the fulfillment of one of their sacred prophecies. It was with the Holy Spirit that He was anointed (cf. Ac. 10: 38; Ps. 45: 47; Isa. 11: 2-5; 42: 1-4; 59: 21). It was as a CONQUERING KING that the Jews were expecting their Messiah to be anointed, but the wonderful representation of this verse is of a Saviour.

A fly-fold ministry was to be His as the anointed of God. (1) "To proclaim good tidings to the poor." The poor are always objects of God's special regard and the gospel's special blessing (ch. 6: 20; 7: 22; Isa. 29: 9; Zeph. 3: 12; Zech. 11: 11; Matt. 5: 3; 11: 5; Jas. 2: 5). The modern church has departed widely from this point from the Master's mission (2) "To proclaim release to the captives," captives of the devil and sin (Luke 13: 16; Jno. 8: 31, 32, 34). Jesus came from them alone and He alone (Jno. 8: 36). (3) "Recovering of sight to the blind," the spiritually blind (Jno. 9: 39-41; 1 Jno. 5: 20). (4) "To set at liberty the physically blind and still more them that are bruised," bruised by Satan (Gen. 3: 15). What a merciless bruiser he is, but there is One who can set at liberty those whom He has the most utterly crushed, the "Anointed" one (Ac. 10: 38). (5) "To proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord," i.e., the great millionth jubilee of which the fifty year jubilee of Israel was a type (Lev. 25: 8-13, 50-54).

III. Usefulness & fruitfulness, Mk. 4: 26-29.

If we have the light of God's Word, we should set it forth where all can see. It must be enlightened, and cheered and served by it (v. 21, 22; Matt. 5: 14-16). The secret things of our own lives will all be brought to light some day (v. 22). Ears are given to hear with and the possession of hearing involves a great responsibility (v. 24). The Gospel is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth (Rom. 1: 16), but believing comes by hearing (Rom. 10: 17). Many have never heard it even in America or England, but it is being heard and listened to when they have heard. They will be lost, but there will be no one to blame but themselves. They did not "take heed" what they heard (v. 24). "If we hear the right things in the right way it means life, but if we listen to the wrong things or turn a deaf ear to the right things, it means death. So life and death are not dependent upon how we use our ears. How solemn these words are, especially in these days of multiplying errors." "Take heed what ye hear" (v. 24). Dunning heretics are springing up on every hand and in most unexpected quarters, evil men and impostors are waxing "worse and worse just as God said they would 'in the last days'" (2 Tim. 3: 1, 13). Wherein then lies safety. In obeying our Lord Jesus and taking "heed what we hear" and in taking Paul's advice and continuing in the study of and belief in the Scriptures (2 Tim. 3: 13-17).

IV. Where Christ is, There is the Kingdom, Luke 17: 20, 21.

There can be no kingdom of God without God. It is a viewpoint of modernism that the Kingdom is in every one and all that is needed is

its development. This may suit the evolutionist, only it is not true. The Kingdom could not be in the Christ - rejecting unregenerated Pharisees. What Jesus really said was "The Kingdom is in the midst of you." That was because Jesus, the King, was there. The Kingdom is only where Jesus is just now, He is at the right hand of God waiting the appointed time when His Kingdom will be set up in the earth (Dan. 2: 44; Ac. 2: 32-36; Rev. 19: 11-14). It is also true that by the Holy Spirit of Christ who is the Spirit of Christ Christ dwells in our hearts by faith (Eph. 3: 17; Gal. 2: 20; Phil. 3: 20, 21 R. V.).

STOP spell-stop: but it may spell ACCIDENT to the motorist who disregards its meaning. The Ontario Highway Department warns that the unlawful practice of merely slowing up and driving on past a stop sign is all too common. And any driver who is guilty of the practice is risking a STOP at the hospital!

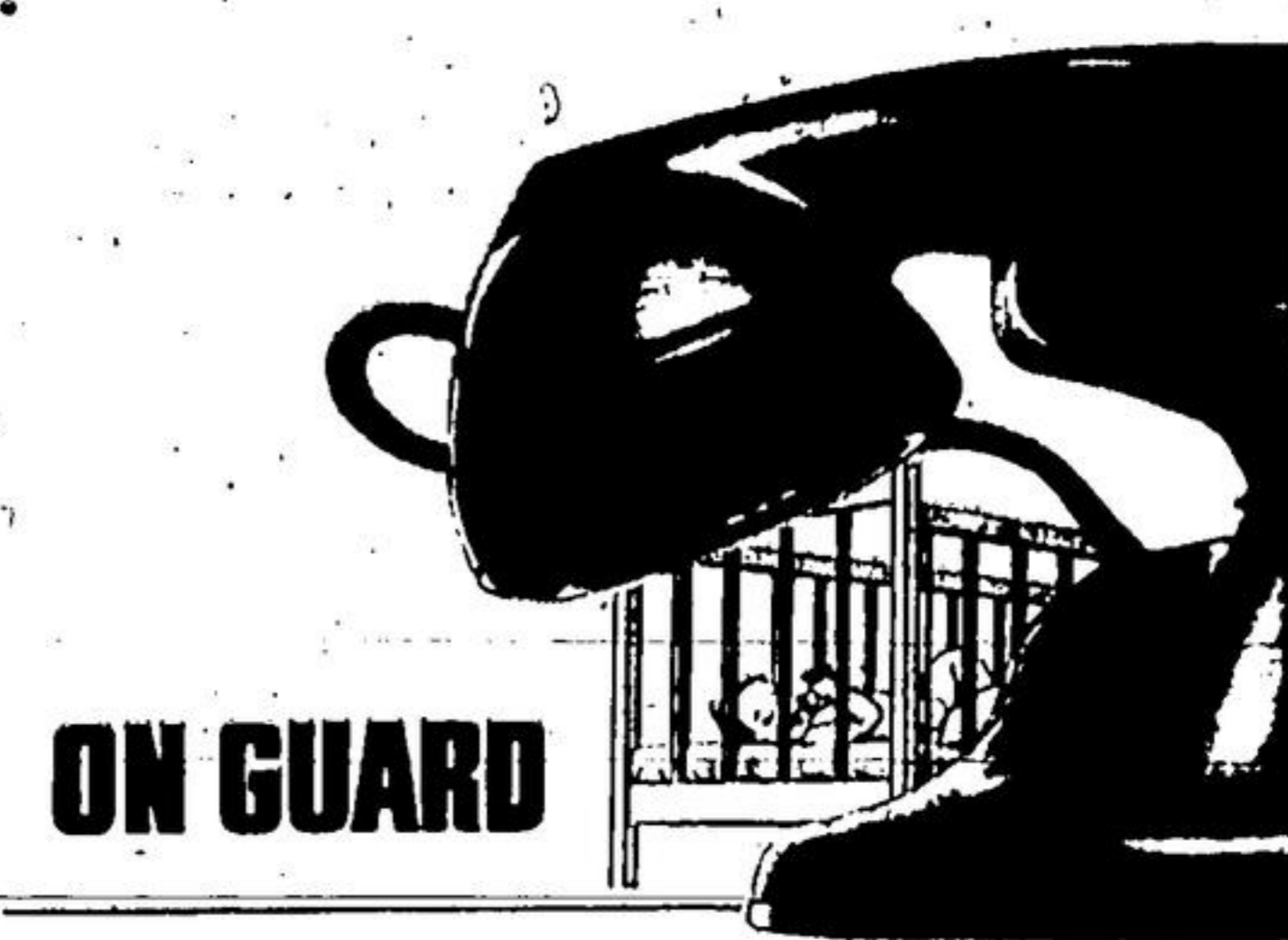
