Daylight Saving By-Law Passed by the Council

Grading and Levelling in War-time Housing Discussed With Contractors—New Lights Are Sanctioned in Subdivision—Auditor's Report Presented and Accepted—Group Insurance Plan for Employees Presented to Council

Acton Council met in regular session last night with Councilors McLeod, Davidson, McIsaac and Deputy Reeve Coon present and Reeve F. J. McCutcheon presiding. Accounts were passed for payment as follows:

Mr. Spillie, who is doing some grading in the War-time Housing Subdivision discussed with Council the Corporation's share of the grading and levelling to be done. Mr. Spillie felt there was enough fill on the property and he could do the work best as he was doing that required by the Construction Co. He felt the fill and grading required would be under \$2000.00. This was in keeping with the estimate on the work. The Clerk was to make further inquiry before an agreement was made.

Mr. C. Rogvaldson presented his tax bill and Mr. Harrop explained that the assessment was in error. It was \$100 higher than it should be. Mr. Rogvaldson had not received an assessment notice last fall. Council agreed to make the adjustment and provided for this in a resolution.

Mr. M. Symon asked Council to give some consideration of council to drain his lot and street adjoining. It was felt the drainage on Beaver Ave. West should have some attention. Council asked Mr. Harrop to measure up the drainage required and agreed this street should be properly drained.

Mr. Harrop reported on the fire culverts and also that the street grader would be here on April 25th to grade the streets.

A by-law to adopt daylight saving time for 1948 was read as required and passed. Daylight saving time will be effective in Acton from Sunday, April 25th to Sunday, September 26th.

A letter from the County Assessor asked that the assessor and a member of council attend the convention in London.

A letter from the Music Festival Association requested a donation and council gave a donation of \$10.

No information could be secured on the installation of a police signal light although the Clerk had endeavored to secure it.

The Clerk was instructed to advertise for tenders for the construction of operating a booth in the Park during the summer.

The Clerk was asked to write Mr. Wendover requesting that he finish his contract on grading and levelling on the streets in the War-time Housing subdivision.

Council authorized the Public Utilities Commission to install lights on Wallace Street and Mason and McDonald Boulevards.

Council authorized the Clerk to make separate assessments on two lots on Arthur Street that now had two owners. Another property of seven lots on Peel Street was to be divided into separate parcels of lots and assessed to the individual owners.

The auditor's report was received and accepted and the Clerk was instructed to have the usual copies printed.

Chief Harrop expressed his and the family's appreciation of the kindness shown by Council at the time of the death of Mrs. Harrop.

Representatives of the Health and Accident Insurance Company of Waterloo presented a plan of group health insurance for municipal employees. The town was asked to co-operate from a pay deduction standpoint and the employees would appreciate it if the Corporation would pay part of the cost as is done in industry. The employees would like to have the group insurance even if the entire cost were paid by them. The coverage would cost 73c per week for each employee. Acton School Board met in April session on Tuesday evening with Trustees Baird, Kirkness and Benn present and Chairman L. Lovell presiding. There was only one truancy reported due to the hockey game although members present had used some will power to attend school affairs on Tuesday night. Perhaps we should add that Secretary Middleton was also present.

Principal McKenzie reported some gravel had been put in at the school by the municipality. Some fill was required at the rear of the school and it was planned to try cinders.

The usual grant for agriculture was approved. It was planned this year to have a school garden for Grade 7.

The secretary reported that the additional \$12,000 insurance had been placed on the High School buildings. The insurance on the Public School and contents was now \$50,000.

The property committee reported inspection of rooms in the Public School for lighting improvement. The secretary was instructed to secure specifications for the required lighting and then advertise for tenders for the work.

The property committee recommended that grades 7 and 8 should be redecorated this year and tenders should be called for this work.

New Communication System Installed Baxter Laboratories

A new type of communication went into service in the Acton plant of Baxter Laboratories, this week which will expedite the handling of orders and distribution of material very much. The new system is known as the Teletype and by it the Acton plant is connected directly with the company's distribution centre in Toronto from nine o'clock until five o'clock each day.

The installed machine in either office is not large and has a keyboard similar to a standard typewriter. A roll of paper or office forms are fed into the machine and the message sent by the operator in Toronto or in Acton has the message typed directly on the visible sheet coming from the machine in both offices. It is quite feasible to carry on a recorded correspondence between the two offices. The editor was privileged yesterday to see the system in operation and it is most uncanny to see a message coming to and operating a typing machine synchronized with another machine 40 miles distant.

The operation of the key-board is much lighter than that of a typewriter since the touch is by electrical impulses.

This, we believe, is the first installation in Acton. It will give a very useful service in Baxter Laboratories in speeding delivery of the hospital supplies manufactured by the firm.

APPROVAL GIVEN TO MAKE CHANGES AT HOME FOR AGED

The Board of governors of the home for the aged of Peel and Halton counties has been given a free hand to make any alterations to the home recommended by the fire marshal. It was announced last Thursday by Warden J. M. Fraser, Peel County. Decision was reached after members of both County Councils inspected the home and heard a statement from the fire marshal's department.

It was agreed stairways should be enclosed so smoke could not travel through the building in case of fire, and most of the occupants of the third floor will be moved to a room now being used as a chapel. Religious services will be held in the dining-room.

HIGHWAY No. 25 EARLY ATTENTION KEEPS ROAD FAIR

A bouquet goes to the Highway Department for their promptness in repairs to No. 25 between Acton and Milton. The road was unusually badly broken with winter frost in many sections. A road maintainer has been put on and some crushed stone applied with splendid results and the road is quite passable. "Becko" McDonald Never Left the Ice During Entire Game to Spark Sundridge Lads to a 12-6 Win the First of the O.H.A. Finals—Second Game in Barrie To-Night and Fans Look for Locals to Get Into the Game

Led by "Becko" McDonald's dual role as defenseman and auxiliary goalkeeper, Sundridge Beavers made mince-ment out of Acton Tanners' potent power plays on Tuesday night, and took a one game lead in the first of a best of five series to select an O.H.A. Intermediate "B" champion. The muscled defenseman with the unruly locks of hair virtually stymied the Tanners by himself, allowing his three strings of forward tries to converge upon Woods in the Acton cage and bang home 12 goals to the Tanners 6.

In the latter stages of the game but trailed the Beavers by three goals from the first period. The playing a powerful finish, Sundridge whipped three pucks past Woods in the last two minutes while a really disorganized blue-line crew vainly tried to clear the biscuit out of the pay-off slot.
