**TAX NOTICE--1948**

MUNICIPALITY OF ACTON

**First Instalment Now Due**

Attention is drawn to the payment of 1948 taxes, which are now payable in Four Instalments. Taxes are payable to the Municipal Treasurer at the

**ACTON PUBLIC UTILITIES OFFICE**

Instalments Are Due as Follows:

FIRST INSTALMENT - APRIL 15th  
SECOND INSTALMENT - JUNE 15th  
THIRD INSTALMENT - AUGUST 16th  
FOURTH INSTALMENT - OCT. 15th

According to the Tax Collection By-law a penalty of Two per cent. will be added on the amount remaining unpaid after the Fifteenth day of April until the Fifteenth Day of June, and an addition of Four per cent. on the First Instalment remaining unpaid after the Fifteenth Day of June. This penalty applies to each instalment in a similar manner.

The attention of Ratepayers is directed to the Penalties and other clauses as printed on the reverse side of every Tax Notice and explained in detail on Every Tax Bill.

Taxes are NOW due and payable. The Penalty applies if the First Instalment is not met on or before Thursday, April 15th.

The Acton Public Utilities Commission and Staff wish to express their thanks for the kind co-operation in which the kilowatt hours were reduced during the recent power shortage. Owing to this splendid co-operation we did not have to resort to black-outs in Acton.

According to a letter from the H.E.P.C. of Ontario, all power reductions in effect this winter are cancelled.
