Sundridge Win O.H.A. Title in Three Straight

A Northern Ontario senior league is flourishing. Not having lost a contest in their after-hours amusements, Beavers are about the closest anyone can come to a mythical "cock-of-the-north." According to one avid fan, they have played 27 games in 39 days and are now seeking a further jewel on the Ontario crown by adding the northern championship to it.

A deep respect for Acton Tanners was Beavers' promulgation of the final series. "They are the best team we have yet met," a resident of Sundridge declared.

The Tanners can hang their duffel up now. One or two insist that it is the last time. However it be, let no one say that Acton didn't bow out of the final scene with grace. They recorded Beavers a bonfire reception in Acton after returning from the game.

LAST THURSDAY'S GAME.
With a little more polish around the Sundridge net, Acton would have taken the second game of the finals by a handsome score. But Ron Fortune intervened and the Beavers rolled up their second consecutive victory over the Tanners by 7-5 at Barrie last Thursday night.
In a wide-open, breath taking, thrill packed contest, Tanners had a marked edge on territorial play throughout the first and second stanzas, particularly the latter, but seemingly couldn't blink a bulb when the occasion demanded. Even a penalty to a minute "Bucko" McDonald, although it presented numerous opportunities to score, was muffed by over-anxious hickory.
The sparse crowd that attended this second game of the set were provided with the best hockey we have yet seen in O.H.A. circles.
See-Saw Battle
Acton was determined to even the set up at one game apiece and with Kentner's marker at 37 seconds jumped into the lead only to be tied a minute later. Again setting the pace as Lindsay scored the Tanners led. However, Beavers tied it up and added another for insurance.
Down one goal as they entered the second stanza, Tanners made it "even steve" and once more posted a one goal lead on Gillespie's two markers. Beavers notched another and the period ended on a 4-4 basis.
Surging powerfully in the last frame, Beavers whipped home three pucks within the first eight minutes. This was all that was necessary to clinch the affair. Ito Marzo notched Acton's fifth and last at 15.35, to finish the scoring.
Wheeler, a speedy winger, patrolling the right dasher supplied Beaver's heaviest scoring punch. He wended his way in three times to beat Woods on lovely drives that plucked the upper left corner. A blazing shot, it hardly gave any chance to Woods and his angle hoists made more inroads on the Acton cage than any other in the series.
Acton drowned Beavers in the second session under repeated waves of attack. When McDonald went off for hooking, Tanners spent the entire length of his penalty shooting at Hill in Beaver's nets. Not one quick eluded him. Hardly phenomenal—merely luck. Although no official count was given it is estimated Acton outshot Sundridge on a 3-1 ratio in that session.
It was the last period surge that paid dividends for Beavers. Defensive hockey stymied Tanners from here in.

This tilt was the most bitterly fought of the series. Mye Sedaty, Beavers' pivot was injured by a hard check and was unable to finish the round.
For Tanners, Kentner, Hilson and Ito Marzo sparkled offensively and played together as a unit. Gillespie waltzed in twice for two markers when relegated to the second string.
