Erin Township Adopts Daylight Saving Time

Many Other Items of Township Business on Agenda at Special and Regular Meetings

A special meeting of Erin Council was held March 11th. Members were all present.

Council authorized the Erin Township branch of the Federation of Agriculture to purchase and distribute warble fly powder throughout the Township. Powder to be paid for by the municipality.

The Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Councilor Wheeler were appointed delegates to attend demonstration of Crang Spraying Equipment at Toronto on March 12th.

Erin Council met in regular session on April 5th. All members were present. Reeve Goldwin Burt presiding.

A by-law setting the time for the beginning and the closing of daylight saving time was passed, commencing on April 25 at 12:01 a.m. and closing on the 26th day of September at 12:01 a.m., 1948.

The Reeve was appointed to attend a meeting of the Grand Valley Conservation Authority to be held at Kitchener on April 9th.

The Wellington County Council was requested to reconsider a motion made in Dec., 1947 regarding the taking over as a County Road of the Erin-Caledon town line providing that the Counties of Peel and Dufferin co-operate.

The Council and Road Superintendent be a committee to inspect roads and bridges within the township, to meet at the call of the Reeve.

The Road Superintendent was instructed to notify patrolmen to store all snow fence in their respective divisions and report number of rolls. Snow fence must not be lent for personal use.

The treasurer was authorized to deposit \$300 in the Bank of Nova Scotia at Acton. Money to be used in the payment of road cheques in that area.

Insurance policy with the Pilot Insurance Co. on the Sawyer - Massey snow plow and grader was renewed.

That the Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Councilor Wheeler be paid \$5.00 each for expenses for attending spraying demonstration in Toronto.

Hospital account for indigents from Erin Township was paid to the County of Wellington for the year 1947. Half cost was \$341.86

\$25.00 was donated to Hillsburg Spring Horse Show.

An order was placed through Ing Jackson, agent, for 30 rolls snow fence at 11 1/2¢ per ft. and 180 posts at 60¢ each.

Accounts paid: general accounts, \$7.00; relief accounts, \$216.20; sheep accounts, \$7.00; road accounts, \$2,577.15. Council adjourned to meet again on Monday, May 3rd at 1 o'clock p.m.
