Mrs. George Lush is still confined to bed with her sister, Miss Marie Lorie and daughter, Mrs. Art Turner, attending her.

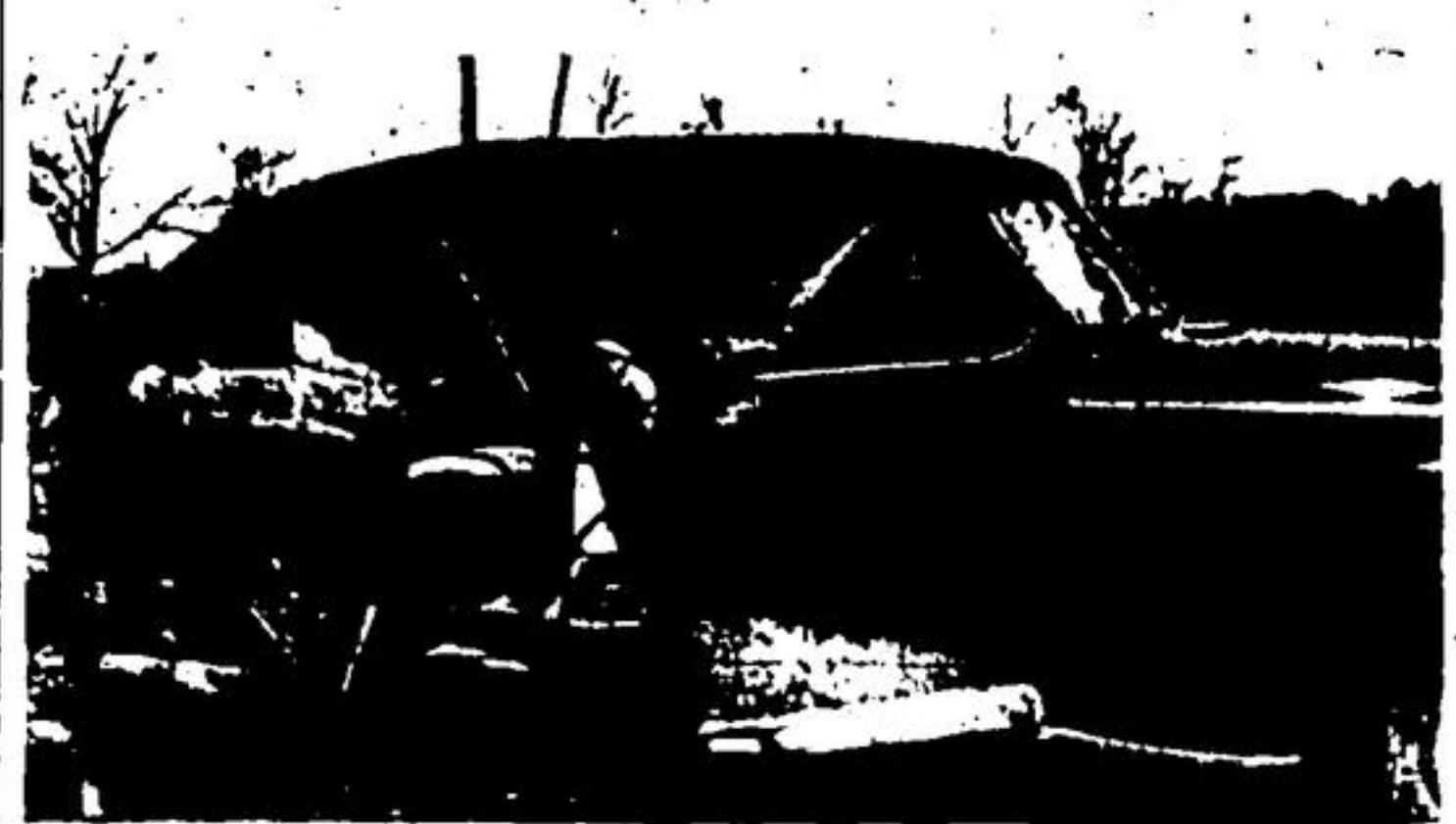

Voters' List Act

(REFERRED TO IN SECTION 59)

Notice of Sittings of Revising Officers in the Electoral District of Halton

TAKE NOTICE that sittings of the Revising Officers for the purpose of hearing complaints or appeals with regard to the Voters' Lists to be used at the election of a member of the Assembly pending for the Electoral District of Halton, will be held at the following times and places, to hear complaints as to the list of voters for all the polling subdivisions in each of the municipalities mentioned, namely:-

1. TOWN OF OAKVILLE—On Monday the 16th day of May, 1948, at the Council Chamber. The Clerk to the Revising Officer will be C. H. BYERS, Oakville, Ontario, and the last day for filing appeals will be the 6th of May, 1948.

2. TOWNSHIP OF TRAFALGAR—On Tuesday, the 11th day of May, 1948, at the Township Hall, and at the Orange Hall, Bronte. The Clerk to the Revising Officer will be SHELDON FEATHERSTONE, Trafalgar, Ontario, and the last day for filing appeals will be the 7th of May, 1948.

3. TOWNSHIP OF NASSAGAWEYA—On Wednesday, the 12th day of May, 1948, at the Township Hall. The Clerk to the Revising Officer will be L. W. McMILLAN, R. R. No. 2, Rockwood, Ontario, and the last day for filing appeals will be the 8th of May, 1948.
