DENTAL CARE OF SCHOOL CHILDREN IN ESQUEWING AREA

At its meeting on Monday evening April 26th the members of the Esquewing Township School Board Area voted unanimously to institute a program for the dental care of the children in their schools.

The beginning of dental care in the schools in Esquewing Township marks the completion of coverage of this service in Halton County in those rural areas served by Area School Boards, since the Boards in Nassagaweya, Nelson and Trafalgar Townships already have such programmes well under way.

By this plan all primary school children in the Board Area will have free dental care available to them. The cost of this service will be borne jointly by the Area School Board and by the Provincial Department of Health.

Local dentists will make periodic surveys of the schools to determine which children need care. The parent will be notified of the dentist's findings, will make his own appointment with his own family dentist and the necessary work will be done by his family dentist.

It is felt that this service will be of great value to school children and will be an important factor in establishing and maintaining good health in the school population.

Negro Spirituals Provides Fine Evening at B.Y.P.U.

Rev. L. Keith Daniels of McNeil Baptist Church, Hamilton was the guest speaker at special meeting of the B.Y.P.U. in Acton on Monday evening. Mr. Daniels gave a lecture on the origin and compilation of Negro spirituals and sang several of the best known songs. Following a song service led by Rev. C. R. Gower, Bernice Comor led in prayer and the Scripture was read by Ronnie Crippa and Mrs. Chas. Landsborough. Mr. and Mrs. J. Velthuis of Guelph sang a duet and a Bible contest was conducted by Mr. Gower. Helen West, president of the B.Y.P.U., extended a welcome to those from other churches and introduced the speaker.

Mr. Daniels first selection was 'Joshua Fought the Battle of Jericho'. He said that the reason the negroes like that song was that they had been slaves like the Israelites and God had delivered them. They looked forward to being freed after death and they thought of heaven as a camp meeting as in the song 'Deep River', which was Mr. Daniels' next selection.

The speaker said that as no one knows the origin of the negro spiritual except that they were spread by uneducated but zealous preachers and travelling musicians who had strong memories. He said that there was a great difference between the American negro who liked harmony and the African negro who was a master of rhythm. The darkies of the south had developed their own melody and harmony even though they had been herded by whites. In developing their music they have kept rhythm of the feet dancing and rhythm of the head and body for songs of praise. These points were illustrated in 'Little David Play on Your Harp' and 'Steal Away'. Mr. Daniels concluded with 'Sometimes I Feel Like a Motherless Child', 'Nobody Knows the Trouble I See', 'Swing Low Sweet Chariot'. He never said a 'Humbler Word', and 'Were You There When They Crucified my Lord'. Mr. and Mrs. Velthuis sang a selection in the Dutch tongue.

At the close of the service a social period was enjoyed in the basement of the church.

TRAFALGAR HERD CONTINUES TO PILE UP JERSEY RECORDS

Few Jersey herds in Canada complete more records than those completed by the Jerseys in the Featherstone herd at Trafalgar, in Halton County. The Featherstone herd has been very much in the limelight lately owing to the new Canadian Long Distance record established by Fairy Raleigh Zana as well as the Long Distance record of Almonte Gentle Fern. Now a daughter of Fern comes along with a splendid record, Avonlea King's Fern—12350—that has produced at six years of age, 10,482 lbs. of milk, 65% lbs. of fat with an average test of 6.63% in 365 days.

Avonlea Standard Design's Lassie—149640, has completed a sonner three-year-old record of 13,100 lbs. of milk, 67% lbs. of fat in 365 days with an average test of 5.15%.

Another daughter of Silver Spring April King, Avonlea King's Iona Lassie, 149638, has completed a senior three-year-old record of 11,215 lbs. milk, 55% lbs. fat in 305 days with an average test of 4.91%.

Avonlea Hamlet's Marjorie, 129755, has completed a nine-year-old record of 8,446 lbs. milk, 52% lbs. fat in 305 days with an average test of 5.58%. This is Marjorie's fifth record, averaging over 500 lbs. per record.

Avonlea King's Daydream, 137801, at six years of age in 315 days produced 10,691 lbs. milk, 52% lbs. fat with an average test of 4.91%. Five other records have been completed in the Avonlea herd.

ation fund or policy for the laid employees, providing the said employees contribute 48c per week each toward same.

Mrs. C. Rognvaldson and E. Hufnagel in a letter made a complaint of the speeding on Main Street North and asked that speed laws be enforced. They also asked that the road be treated for the dust nuisance. The letter was turned over to the Chief of Police for attention.

The Clerk was authorized to secure 15 tons of calcium for laying dust on the streets. It was decided to purchase two plates for the Corporation truck with two inch letters.

A letter from the Canadian National Railways was read regarding improving the crossing on Main Street North.

Sale of \$10,000 debentures of 2% and 3% was authorized at 95.75 to Anderson & Co.

A letter was read by the solicitor from Holmsted, Sutton, Hill and Kemp and gave details of the transfer of lands on Maple Street to the Corporation of Acton. Copies of legal documents were received. Council by resolution authorized the signing of documents required for transfer of this property but these are to be held until the order for the new street allowance is received from the owners of Armaco Ltd. This factory property will likely soon be offered for sale.

The Solicitor read a copy of the traffic by-law passed in 1920 and the draft of a new by-law which incorporated new provisions that were deemed advisable to meet the present day conditions. The by-law was given first reading and was to be sent down for approval of the Department.

The tender of E. W. Coles for the privilege of operating a booth in the park was accepted at \$35 for the season. Council discussed repairs to the building back of the Town Hall to make a garage for the truck. A new power lawn mower has been ordered for the park.
