DENTAL CARE OF SCHOOL CHILDREN IN ESQUESING AREA

At its meeting on Monday evening April 26th the members of the Esquesing Township School Board Area voted unanimously to institute a program for the dental care of the children in their schools.

The beginning of dental care in the schools in Esquesing Township marks the completion of coverage of this service in Halton County in those rural areas served by Area School Boards, since the Boards in Nassagaweya, Nelson and Trafalgar Townships already have such programmes well under way

By this plan all primary school children in the Board Area will have free dental care available to; them. The cost of this service will be borne jointly by the Area School Board and by the Provincial Department of Health.

Local dentists will make periodic surveys of the schools to determine which children need care. The parent will be notified of the dentist's findings, will make his own appointment with his own family dentist and the necessary work will be done by his family

It is felt that this service will be of great value to school children and will be an important factor in establishing and maintaining good health in the school populaton.
