Britain's new atomic pile at Harwell is expected this summer to start producing radium-actives isotopes—artificial radio activity produced in about 15 hours compared with 2,000 years for radium. The Ministry of Supply estimates that the increased production will meet the demands of all research workers in Britain. Atomic research scientists in Britain have hitherto been producing isotopes from GLEEP
