BRITAIN'S MERCHANT FLEET NEARS PRE-WAR STRENGTH

Although Britain's merchant navy lost more than 11,000,000 tons of shipping during the war it is now only 1,000,000 tons short of pre-war strength. This was stated by Mr. Alfred Barnes, Minister of Transport, June 8th at a press conference in London. Great Britain he said, entered the war with 16,900,000 tons of gross shipping. At the present time and after substantial rebuilding which reflected great courage on the part of owners to order at present prices, tops gross.

NOTICE is hereby given that, in accordance with the Weed Control Act of Ontario, all NOXIOUS WEEDS growing on property within the limits of any and all incorporated towns, villages, and subdivided portions of townships in the County of Halton must be destroyed.

After July 15th, 1948, the Weed Inspector may enter upon any property on which Noxious Weeds are growing and proceed with men and machinery to destroy same, the expenses to be charged against the property in taxes.

The co-operation of all is requested. The Weed Inspectors are prepared to enforce the provisions of this Act.
