"In considering Ontario Winter Wheat policy for the crop year commencing July 1st, 1948, the Government has decided that the price ceiling on Ortarlo Winter Wheat can be removed and this action will be effective as of today the eighteenth of June. The present Treasury payment of eight cents per bushel is discontinued with the removal of the price ceiling. This means that the price of Ontario Winter Wheat will be free to find its own level after prevailng conditions".

Since the above announcement yas issued all export resetrictions have been removed and wheat is currently quoted around the \$1.75 mark. It has been reported to us that under the Marshall plan experts from participating countries must not sell above the American price and at the present time American winter wheat flour is selling in the West Indies at the equivalent price of \$1.75 per bushel ir: New York. We cannot vouch for the authenticity of the above statement but it was secured from a reliable source. If correct, it would appear to more or less establish a set price based on the price of American Winter Wheat which price does seem to be out of line with that of hard spring wheat which is selling across the line at \$2.40 per bushel.

Showery Weather Delays Haying Operations

During the past two or three weeks little or no progress has been made in the handling of Halton's hay crop. The frequent showers while spoiling some hay and delaying the progress of farm work, have improved spring grain prospects materially. Winter wheat looks like a bumper crop although some fields are beginning to lodge.

In the fruit and vegetable sections of Halton prospects are also very promising. As usual the biggest headache is lack of experienced or even partially experienced farm labour. While the consumer is bemoaning the high cost of many farm products, farm revenue is still too low to compare with industry in the labour market. Halton is one of the very few counties in Ontario where the Federal Government has failed to establish an employment service. Consequently the job of attempting to cope with the demand for farm labour has as in former years been left! on the door-step of the Agricultural office at Milton. In a brief Interview with the Agricultural! Representative we learned that while a few Westerner Harvesters, a few British immigrants, some Hollanders, a few more European D.P.'s and some holiday workers from Toronto, have been secured the demand far exceeds those secured, which totals around 50 from all sources.
