MISS MARIAN McDUGALL

The following obituary appeared in the Lucknow Sentinel of last week and will be read with interest by many friends here who came to know Miss McDougall here. A few years ago, the Mission Board of the Presbyterian church refused an application for service for the foreign field. This, mattered little, as a more complete dedication of this life to the cause of Christ was hardly possible. Wherever her work as a teacher took her, Marian McDougall was active in church work in the choir, Sunday School, Young People's Society and missionary causes.

Born in Kinloss Township she obtained her early education at the Second School. Even at an early age her daily kindnesses made a lasting impression on her schoolmates. She continued her studies in Lucknow Continuation School while residing with G. H. Smith. As she helped her friends with their problems her life work was made clear to her. After attending North Bay Normal School she taught in Golden Valley for five years. Further study at Stratford Normal School resulted in a position in Culross Township. From there she came to Lucknow Public School. Her eight years of excellent teaching endeared her to young and old and the influence of her consecrated living on the children under her care never measured. She also served briefly on the public school staffs in Springfield and Acton.

Miss MacDougall passed away at The Manse on Tuesday morning, June 29th. She had been critically ill for some time, but her gallant spirit made every moment spent in her presence a blessing to her associates. She deeply appreciated the many kindnesses of her friends during her illness.

Surviving are two sisters, Mrs. C. H. MacDonald (Katharine) and Mrs. Peter Campbell (Etta) of Lucknow and one brother, Mr. Gordon MacDougall of Windsor; also three half-sisters, Evelyn, Mrs. Fred Cox; Dorothy, Mrs. Percy Crozier; and Freda, Mrs. Leonard MacLennan and her step-mother Mrs. John MacDougall. The funeral service was held on Thursday, July 1st, in the Lucknow Presbyterian Church at three o'clock conducted by Rev. John Anderson, B.A., M.C. and Bar, of Acton, assisted by Rev. C. D. Cox, formerly of Golden Valley. Miss Lulu Warner of the Acton Public School sang "God Hath Not Promised." Rev. R. D. MacDonald of Tillsonburg presided at the organ.

Historical Indian Burial Pit Now Being Explored

Huron Indian bones in large numbers were dug from a burial pit at a site not far west of Midland, Ontario, by workers from the Royal Ontario Museum of Archaeology, last summer. This summer the excavations are being continued, and are of such scientific importance that the diggers will camp on the site itself. This osuary wherein so many Indians were laid at the periodic feast of the dead is proving of exceptional importance in enriching Ontario history.

Discovered by Mrs. Frank Ridley of Idlington, about 3 years ago, this Huron burial ground is believed to be the one described in great detail by Father Brobeuf (the martyr) in the Jesuit Relations of 1636, and which was sponsored by the Indian village of Ossosane then existing nearby. Brobeuf saw this osuary in actual use. It is hoped that the current excavations and research involved, will identify the site beyond doubt, one of the first of such Huron sites to be so authenticated.

Under the leadership of Mr. Kenneth E. Kidd, deputy-keeper of the Ethnological Collector, at the Royal Ontario Museum, eight keen workers including high school and university students are carrying on the exploratory work. Says Mr. Kidd: "Much will be learned not only about Huron burial customs, but also about Huron physique. Until now, very little has been known of the physical anthropology of these people. But the abundant human remains will provide a good body of material for the study of this aspect of their culture and condition."

There is an immense display of Indian remains, clay pipes, pottery fragments, beads and other relics from Museum-sponsored excavations in Ontario, always on view at the Royal Ontario Museum.

THE PROGRESSIVE TOWN

Towns are often urged to be progressive, and to keep up with modern ideas. The question may be asked, as to what a town has to do in order to be rated as progressive. The spirit of progress might be defined as a desire to keep up with modern times, and to keep making improvements, in so far as these may be practical considering the resources and size of the community. New projects might be suggested that would be admirable for a community if they could be afforded, but which would be too costly for many communities.

Good practical judgment says that people should not be satisfied with things just as they were in the old days, and should be looking for gains and improvements that are reasonably within their reach.

MANGELS FOR FOOD

Greater attention will be given to the production of mangels for human consumption in Germany where a process which removes the bitter taste and pungent smell of the mangel has been developed. The root has a higher calorific yield per acre than either potatoes or turnips, and the foliage can be used for silage, thus increasing the crop value by about 30-35 per cent. The treated mangels may be used as vegetables, processing into marmalade, or into flour suitable for blending with wheat flour in the proportion of 20 to 35 per cent.
