Irrigation Can Also Fertilize

Farmers in some parts of Canada, either because it is essential or because it is extra profitable for some crops, irrigate their land. Their chief purpose naturally is to supply water to the thirsty soil during the dry months of the year. Actually a second purpose may be achieved, for the water contains minerals in soution that have some value as fertilizers.

The irrigation water used in the Okanogan Valley of British Columbla, for example, has been the subject of ir.vestigation for its fertility value at the Dominion Experimental Station, Summerland, B.C. says J. C. Wilcox who is in charge of the plant nutrition laboratory. Of the three nutrient elements tested so far, phosphorus, potassium and calcium, the last two are present in the water in appreciable amounts.

Phosphorus occurs in small quantities only. In samples of water obtained from all the chief! irrigation systems in the Okanogara the amounts of phosphorus were equivalent to only 0.1 to 3.0 lbs. of 18 per cent superphosphate per the home of Mr. John Beamish. acre foot of water. The average was around 0.5 pound. This would mean that if three feet of water were applied to the land each year it would be the equivalent of only family in the loss of their father. about 1.5 pounds of superphoswhate an acre.

With potassium it is somewhat different. The amounts found were equivalent to 5 to 26 pounds of muriate per acre foot of water. The average was around 10 lbs. A grower using three feet of water a year would thus apply enough potash to equal about 30 lbs. per acre annually. This should be a distinct help in mair.taining the potassium content of the soil.

The story with calcium is even better. The lime content of the water ranged from 37 to 366 lbs. per acre foot, with an average of around 200 pounds. Thus a grower using three feet of water would apply about 600 pounds of lime annually. Under such circumstar.ces there is little likelihood of his soil ever running short of calcium as a ton. plant nutrient.



TIME TAKES A TUMBLE



One-hour and 48 minutes flying time was slashed from the transcontinental flight record recently when a new pressurized North Star Skyliner of Trans-Canada Air-Lines flashed across the 2,345 miles from Vancouver to Montreal in just aix hours and 52 minutes to set a new mark. The new North Star, shown in upper photo, spanned the distance at an average altitude of 20,000 feet and speed of 342 milesper-hour with no discomfort to the 20 passengers and crew of six.
