The Simple Tale of Profits

By Joseph Lister Rutledge. The attempt to make profits appear as something else than they are is a favorite trick of the leftist forces of communism and socialism. It permits an easy, if completely un sound, division of people into workers and profiteers. It suggests that there is something sinister in making two blades of grass grow where one grew before. Perhaps that is why the C.C.F. party gained substantially in Ontario in the recent election and lost even more substantially in Saskatchewan. The forces of socialism and labor gained in the industrial communities where it was easy to confuse the meaning of profits and lost in the agricultural areas where profit became simple and easily understood.

Development Plan for Scottish Highlands

An experimental scheme to restore life and prosperity to the beautiful but deserted glens of the Scottish Highlands has been launched in a 400 square mile area in the North of Scotland. Planned development of the glens and forestry is the keynote of the scheme. Special housing communities for forestry workers will help increase local trade and the building of new roads and the provision of electricity and other services will be important additional features of the scheme.

Export Cattle '47 Worth \$15 Million

Exports of live cattle from Canada to all destinations in 1947 totalled \$3,233 head, says the Annual Review of the Live Stock Market and Meat Trade, issued by the Marketing Service of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. Of the total, 29,897 were purchased. Of these 28,248 went to the United States, 310 to the United Kingdom, 797 to China and the remainder were shared by about 20 other countries, mostly in South America and the Caribbean area.
