### The Sunday School Lesson

NUNDAY-JULY . 25

SACRIFICIAL FRIENDSHIP Golden Text. A friend loveth at all times. Prov 17:17. Exposition - I. Frietziship of

Jonathan and David, 8:1-4. There is something singularly beautiful in the mutual love of Jonathan and David. The wordly literests of the two were opposed. Jonathan was heir-apparent to the throne of Israel; David the divinely chosen king. Yet each quite lost sight of selfish ambition, and even personal self-interest. in his love for the other, Jonathan loved David as his own soul (vs. 1, 17; ch. 18:3), and at the peril of his life, protected him from the wild anger of Saul (vs. 32, 33). In doing this, he voluntarily renounced his own aspirations to the throne David, on his part, bitterly lamented the death of Jonathan, although the death cleared his way to the throne (2 Sam 17-27). In studying this lesson, the whole of ch. 20 may be considered with profit. David had been perfeetly safe in Naioth. Saul had sent three companies to take him. from carrying out Saul's bloodthirsty designs. Then Saul him: self had been humbled (ch. 19:little need for David's fleeing from the wrath of Saul, from a Notice to Creditors place of security such as he had in Naioth (ch. 20:1; cf. out for David just what his father's attitude toward him might be. He was to tell him the exact all others having claims against facts whether they were good or evil. How often we see moral or spiritual peril confronting those to whom we profess to be friends, and yet do not warn them. At first, Jonathan -had been' very confident that his father plotted no evil (v. 2), but David had shows, him that he might be mistaken. Evidently Jonathan's confidence in his father was not very deep. It is an appalling thing when a father's characteer such that even his own son, a son of so trustful a nature as Jonathan, is forced to distrust him. II. Saul's Envy and Hatred of

David, 19:1-3 David's great achievement raised him at once to a high position in the estimation of Saul and in the army (ch. 18:2), but it did not turn David's head, he acted with remarkable modesty (18:18, 23). He conducted himself with great wisdom and perfectly obeyed all Saul's orders, though he knew that he had been himself definitely appointed to the chief leadership of Israel (18:5). He walted God's time. Though Saul was at first disposed to put David forward, his envy was soon aroused (18:6-8). The instance recorded here was not the first time that Saul sought to kill David (18:10-12, 17, 25, 29). Saul had been the idol of the people (11:11, 12) and it is hard to give up such a place to another without a pang of jealousy. Even among Christians, Jealousy is not altogther unknown, but it is a noxious and rank-growing weed and should be torn up at its first appearance. The small man cannot forgive the great man for being great.

Saul whimpered like a small child, he had not even serke enough to keep his chagrin to himself (18:8). God had told him that He has chosen a better man than himself to be king in his place (15:28; 13:14). His jealous heart jumped at once to the conclusion that David was this better man of whom God had spoken (20:31). He was filled with rage to see the kingdom shipping from his hands It. the better days he had not desired the kingdom for himself (10:21, 22); now he would not give it up In the history of Saul we see the tragedy of a soul; the same story in all its essential features has been repeated again and again From the day that Saul heard the women extolling David above himself, there was no peace nor joy for Saul, he never looked at David without a feeling, of envy and hate. There is something marvelously beautiful in Jonathan's unselfish love for David He knew that David's sucmeant his loss of throne, but none the less he "delighted much a David," and sought to save David's life Jonathan's unselfish love looks all the more beautiful over against the background of Saul's persistent envy and hatred.

III. Saul Hearkened Unto the Voice of Jonatham 4-6.

It took courage as well as selfsacrifice on Jonathan's part to speak good of David unto his father (ch. 20:32-33). The envious heart counts every one an enemy that speaks well of the object of its hate But in this case, Jonathun's argument for David was ununswerable and his words toward Saul had been "very good."
