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**NEW PROCESS CAN RAISE STEEL OUTPUT**

United Kingdom scientists have established a world lead in developing a new steel-making process which may revolutionize the industry in Britain. It is said to constitute one of the most significant advances in steel production methods for 100 years and to be comparable to the invention of the Bessemer process. Adopted after long research, it involves the introduction of oxygen to the air blast in the converter. The results are claimed to be: a 50% increase in output, more flexibility of control, higher quality steel, the use of a greater percentage of scrap and, in the long run, cheaper production. The process has been tried out in a Leeds foundry and steel, which formerly took fifteen minutes to make, is now being made there in eight minutes. The process was developed by scientists of the British Iron and Steel Research Association, which is sponsored by the whole industry, in co-operation with the Leeds company.
