## First Case of Polio Reported in Halton in 1948

County Medical Officer Gives Advice to Combat the Spread of Disease

The first case of poliomyelitis this year in Halton County has been reported to Dr. James M. Mather, county medical officer of health, from the village of Norval, in Equeusing township. Victim of the disease is nine-year-old Virginia Singer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Singer of Norval.

The little girl's father revealed that she had been visiting friends in Toronto, where she took ill last Tuesday. She was removed to the Hospital for Sick Children, in Toronto where it was confirmed she was suffering from Polio. It is reported that she has not suffered any paralysis as a result of the attack.

Dr. Mather advised, all parents and persons in the county to take extreme care during the coming month, and report any illness to their family physician.

Dr. Mather further stated, "unless cases appear within the next few weeks it does not seem likely that we will be faced with an epidemic this year."

"Little is known of the method of spread of this disease but everyone would be wise to heed the following advice given by the Ontario Department of Health," he added.

1. Do not use unsafe milk or water.
2. Do not let children swim in polluted water.
3. If there are cases in your community, keep children away from parties, swimming pools, movies or public gatherings.
4. Kill flies, protect food from flies, eliminate fly breeding places.
5. Pay more attention to sanitation and central cleanliness.
6. Children should not be allowed to become over-tired.
7. Wash all fruit and vegetables which are to be eaten raw.
8. If your child has an unexplained illness call your physician at once.
9. Do not become panicky, only a few cases suffer from paralysis.
10. If you wish further information, contact your physician, your Public Health Nurse or your County Health Unit.

## Milton Wins Third Game in Play-off Saturday

### Four Innings of Free Hitting Ran Up Nine Runs for Each Team — Milton's Two Home Runs in the Ninth Clinched the Game—Fourth Game is Scheduled for Milton Tonight if Weather Holds

Acton Intermediates had one alternative after last Saturday's game here. Either they capture the next contest or they are eliminated from further O.B.A. competition. Milton won the third contest by a 12-9 score on Saturday in a slugfest that was in keeping with the wild play marking previous play-off encounters, grasping a one game lead in the best of five series.

Four initial frames in which eighteen runs were counted locked both clubs in a 9-9 deadlock that was not broken until the final frame, when two home runs dealt right hander John Mowat a severe blow after hurling a brilliant three hit performance. It was yet "Babe" Clements who came through with the winning run. His towering circuit smash clinched the game for the bynders. Added insurance in the form of another four-master by Gervais and an error contributed to the story book finish.

A particularly calamitous inning, the top half of the fourth was the vital link in Milton's victory chain. Off three scratch hits they rang up seven runs while the local infield croaked like a rusty gate permitting runs to score while they tied themselves in Gordian knots.

It wasn't Bob Footitt's fault they were on the short ends. His over-the-fence homer tied the contest up in the fourth but Milton's last inning splurge netted them a win.

In spite of the score fielding was close to brilliant at times. Two double plays were engineered by the triple A club, one by Masters in the 3rd and another from Jack Waterhouse in the fifth. Loose-knit "Shammie" Rusk of the visitors sparkled at short. His dynamic jaunt on the paths robbed Acton of many hits.

Notching fifteen hits from Marshall and Grenke, Acton outbatted the Red Caps by 15-11. Older timer Bob Anderson, with four hits in five trips and Rod Ryder, substituting for Owen Masales, with a perfect three for three paced Acton.

Sam Snyder nominated as starting hurler was relieved by John Mowat in the fourth with bases loaded. Mowat remained until the end.

**Three Home Runs**  
Milton gleaned a run in the top half of the first inning when Melanson singled, stole second and went home on Stan Fay's safety. Masters on a free ticket was left stranded on third in the Acton half.

Four consecutive hits knocked in two Acton runs during the bottom half of the 2nd frame. Milton went scoreless in the top half. First Masales, then Footitt, Anderson and Snyder singled with the former duo counting.

The third frame saw Stover bounce a hit over the centre field fence that automatically went for a double. He tied the count at 2 all when Anderson's wild throw allowed him to score. Exploding with three singles, Acton went ahead 5-2 as the third stanza lapses. Lindsay clouted a ball over the fence for a double, followed by Robinson with a single and Footitt taking a free trip. Anderson swept the bases clear with a timely single. The home club executed a double bill in the top half.

A preposterous seven runs was chalked up by the Red Caps in the seventh before Acton extinguished them. Every player on the visiting club went to bat at least once. Here, Mowat relieved Snyder on the half for Acton. The congested triple A infield booted the ball over the pasture with one of the looziest demonstrations of fielding seen in a play-off fixture.

It took a home run by Bob Footitt Acton's scintillating centre gardner to again even the count in the Acton half. With two aboard Footitt placed a sturdy drive over the right field wall scoring Robinson and Ryder. Prior to this Lindsay scored on Rod Ryder's smashing blow to deep centre.

From here in Mowat and Grenke, who relieved Marshall in the 4th locked in a pitching duel. No runs counted on either end, as

both clubs settled down. Mowat restricted the visitors to two bingles. Grenke was touched for four. Another double play was pulled by Acton in the fifth when Fay came close to scoring in the eighth but Footitt's kang heave was relayed to Anderson at the plate where he was called out. Argument ensued but to no avail. Umpires were unmoved.

Without parallel in Halton County games, two home runs broke the deadlock and awarded the game to Milton in the top half of the ninth. Veteran "Babe" sent a towering drive over the left field wall while Chuck Gervais smashed a high one into a maple tree situated adjacent to the fence. Both were clouted with no runners on base.

Acton conceded defeat in their half of the ninth by succumbing in order.

## Council Consider Hiring Provincial Police for Acton

### Decide to Advertise for Town Foreman to Do Work on Streets, Etc.

A special meeting of the Acton Council was held last Friday evening to consider the re-adjustment of Municipal offices following the resignation of Mr. E. Harrop as Municipal Officer and assessor. All the councillors and Deputy Reeve were present with Reeve McCutcheon presiding.

Inspector Doyle of the Provincial Police was present and outlined the present salaries of officers. A Corporal is paid \$2,440 per annum; Probation Constables receive \$1,840 and \$1,940 after six months service. The increase in pay is \$100 a year until the rate of \$2,340 is attained. A survey is now being made of the present rates in the province. The Municipality would supply office, telephone, desk, typewriter, filing cabinet etc. Cost of uniforms supplied for police work would be six cents per mile to the Municipality.

At these rates uniforms are supplied and police are covered by compensation and included in a premium arrangement.

It was decided to advertise for a Town Foreman to have charge of all municipal work and to have an agreement submitted and by-law prepared for discussion at a special meeting on Thursday, August 25th.

## Prisoner from Ont. Reformatory Captured in Acton

Claude Gamache one of 3 inmates of the Ontario Reformatory who escaped on Tuesday was apprehended in Acton about 1.30 on Wednesday morning by Constable Grant Allan.

Gamache was seen loitering on Mill Street opposite the Free Press office by Constable Allan. He was questioned when taken to the town hall and locked up for the night. He was identified by guards from the Reformatory the following morning and returned to Guelph.

Gamache, aged 21, of Ottawa was serving a term of 12 months definite and six months indefinite on charges of forgery and breaking parole.

Gamache and the other two who were immediately recaptured were working with a group of some 150 inmates engaged in levelling off swamp land, as part of the institution's landscaping plan. The group was working close to the Toronto Highway, and behind the Wellington Packers property. The three men slipped away from the half-dozen guards, who, armed with rifles, encircled the large group of workers keeping a watchful eye on their manoeuvres. Taking advantage of shrubbery and building, the trio avoided the guards, but with the assistance of citizens who were nearby, two of the escapees were back in custody within a short period.

## Erin Council Sets Rates of Taxation for Year

Grants Made to Fairs and the Auditors' Report is Accepted

Erin Council met on August 5th with all members present and Reeve Gordon Burt presiding.

By-laws for the purpose of striking rates of taxation for the year 1948 were introduced, passed and numbered.

General rates—County 11.8 mills Township 10 mills, General School 4.3 mills, Orton Police Village 9 mills, Hillsburgh 16.5 mills, Hillsburgh Library 2 mills with a maximum of \$3.00 as an assessment.

School rates—School Area No. 1, 6.5 mills; School Area No. 2, 7 mills; U.S.S. No. 2 Erin Village and Township Continuation 51 mills and Public School 6.12 mills; U.S.S. No. 15 Erin and East Garafra 12.4 mills; No. 6 Caledon and Erin, 8 mills; No. 13 Caledon and Erin 13.5 mills; Eramosa School area U.S.S. No. 6 and 7, Eramosa and Erin 31.4. Union schools receive no general grant. U.S.S. No. 2 Erin Village and Twp. Debenture rate 9.15 mills.

The clerk was requested to write a letter of condolence to Mr. Daniel Gray expressing the sincere sympathy of the Council and officials of the Twp. in his recent sad bereavement.

The Road Superintendent was instructed to notify the Hydro Commission that Erin Township would pay half cost of moving 2 poles back from the highway.

Council agreed to pay one-quarter cost of fixing the intersection at 5th line and Dufferin and Wellington County Road, East Garafra Township one quarter, Dufferin and Wellington Counties to pay the remainder. Wellington County to perform the work.

The Auditors report for the year 1947 was received and accepted. Brett and Co. Auditors were paid, as per Contract \$150.00 and for supplies and postage \$7.50 Total \$157.50.

Grants were given as follows: Erin Agricultural Society \$150; Acton Agricultural Society \$25; and Hillsburgh Band \$50.

Accounts were passed and paid as follows: General Accounts \$27.65; Sheep Accounts \$29.00; Relief Accounts \$73.16; Road Accounts \$3905.41.

Council adjourned to meet again on Saturday Sept. 4th, 1948 at 1 o'clock p.m. or at the call of the Reeve.

## Esqueusing Barn Destroyed by Fire In Tuesday's Storm

### Barn and Season's Crop and Thresher Lost by W. Cox

Lightning struck the barn on the farm of Wm. Cox on the townline of Esqueusing and Nasagweya just below Spayside on Tuesday afternoon and destroyed the buildings and contents.

A bull in the barn at the time was taken out and saved but Mr. Cox was unable to get the threshing machine from the building and it and the milking machine were lost in the blaze. The entire hay crop and all but four loads of the season's grain that had been threshed were lost. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

The storm that passed over this district on Tuesday was very heavy but in the section where this farm is located the rain was not as heavy as elsewhere. Mr. and Mrs. Cox watched the storm from the house and as the bolt struck the barn had been hit, but of course were unable to save much as the flames spread rapidly.

The Ontario Department of Agriculture has announced the list of total field scores of the 75-Bushels-Per-Acre Club organized by the Wellington County Crop Improvement Association from farmers of the county.
