### The Realities Engagements Of Wages

By Joseph Lister Rutledge As labor leaders, like business executives, are judged by their ability to produce results. It is perhaps understandable that such leaders, having achieved most of their social objectives, should now concentrate on wages and hours of work. It is perhaps understandable too that they should insist that wases are just that, and shouldn't be qualified, in any way, by the rising cost of commodities. So they ask for wage increases without price increases. It would he wonderful, if it were possible. Unfortunately it lan't, so the distinction must be made between the wage in the pay envelope and what that money will produce in the way of food, clothing, housing and other necessities. This is real wages

As an example, the average in-

dustrial worker in 1944 earned an average annual wage of \$1.- Free Enterprise 564, but he could buy with it only the equivalent of \$1,315. When a farmer starts to do a old paint brush has developed a decided kink with hard turned-up bristles and is unworkable.

To salvage stiff old brushes, soaking overnight, preferably in turpentine, is a well-known preliminary. Gasoline is also effective After the old paint has been softened, it should be scraped off with a blunt knife or combed out with: a steel comb or brush. If the first soaking fails to remove the paint the process can be repeated Shel-Lie brushes should be cleaned with alcohol, and whitewash and cale mine brushes with water


