HONOR TO A FORMER HALTONIAN

Another outstanding honor has come to an already famous Oakville boy, Dr. Brock Chisholm, who has been elected director-general of the new World Health Organization, with headquarters at Geneva. The importance of Dr. Chisholm's new position can hardly be over-estimated under his leadership the World Health Organization will launch a campaign against the terrible sources of malaria, tuberculosis and venereal diseases, and will also attempt to reduce infant mortality. Unfortunately the organization must operate on a very limited budget for the next year, less than five million dollars having been allocated to its needs — a very small sum considering the magnitude of the task. It is hoped that more liberal funds will be placed at the organization's disposal in future to enable it to make some progress in its great and vitally important work.
