GEORGETOWN
 Enrolment at Georgetown High School has been seriously affected by transfer of a majority of Esquimaux students to high schools at Milton and Acton. DISTRIBUTED WEALTH
 The belief that the wealth of the healthy is responsible for the poverty of the poor is implicit in the doctrines of Communism. But, with the average annual hourly pay of all workers in Canada standing at a 90 cents an hour average, no one would be likely to assume that a \$10,000 annual salary was the sort of wealth that was responsible for poverty.
