RECORD HARVEST IN SOUTH AFRICA

South Africa's 1947-48 harvest is the greatest ever reaped in the Union, according to official estimates of the South African Department of Economic and Marketing. Production of maize, tobacco, groundnuts, sunflower seed, kafir-corn, beans and chowee is, in each case, a record. The total number of beef cattle has been the highest for years, and while mutton is only beginning to build up following the 1944-47 drought, it is expected that pork will be marketed in increasing quantities to fill the mutton shortage.

MEETING OF MILK, CREAM PRODUCERS AND PROCESSORS

The Federation of Agriculture in co-operation with the Halton County Health Unit is holding a meeting in the Court House, Milton, on Tuesday, September 28th, at 8 p.m. for the milk and cream producers and processors of Halton County.

The speaker will be Mr. E. S. Churchill, B.S., M.S., Dairy Bacteriologist at the School of Veterinary Medicine, Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan.

Mr. Churchill will speak on the challenging subject: "Will the Sanitary Production of Milk Pay?" He has devoted the last 3 years to field and laboratory studies of the sanitary aspects of milk production both on the farm and in the dairy plant. He has studied not only disinfection with chlorine but also with the other newer compounds. Mr. Churchill's talk is designed to demonstrate that proper sanitary production of milk will not only result in a cleaner, safer milk supply but will also mean more income for the farmer.

Junior Citizens Make Fine Traffic Officers

School bells are ringing again—and it is a pity that they must ring with apprehension and dread in the minds of many Canadian parents. Fear for their children's safety in the traffic on their way to and from school; dread of the terrible toll that our increasing traffic takes in this back-to-school season. More children, of school age or under, were killed by motor cars in Ontario last September than in any other month of the year. What can be done?

There is already evidence of the general worth of the provincial safety campaign, being sponsored by the Department of Highways and supported by the press, radio, and many other agencies. There were fewer traffic accidents in the first half of 1948 than in any other six-month period since the war. But children are another problem. Teaching the rules of safety at school, giving parental advice and impressing the safety factors, urging special caution by motorists and constant police protection of the children, all seem to fail. That is because the care-free younger children, especially, have difficulty understanding or estimating the dangers which exist.

No more effective method of instilling such understanding into young minds has yet been noted than the inspirational experiment being tried in Canada and in several other states. The quality matter of traffic safety is presumably placed in the junior citizen's own hands and to a great extent it actually is. It also works. School safety patrols, composed of older pupils, many of them cadets, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Brownies, are charged with guiding and helping younger children through traffic. They help prevent accidents, and they themselves acquire a new sense of responsibility. Then, an auxiliary force of traffic safety juniors are given the job of acting as traffic watchers. They observe the children who run across an intersection, who cross in the middle of their bikes, or even with their cars. They do not take-tattle to the teachers, but report careless or reckless actions to the Chief Traffic Safety Officer, appointed by the pupils themselves.

The idea works, because the youngsters enjoy it and take it seriously. Instead of resenting constant adult supervision and admonition, the co-operate wholeheartedly. Taking precautions becomes the proud thing to do, not taking foolish risks, and it is serious double-trouble for the youngster who takes a chance in traffic; he has risked an accident, and has a black mark with the traffic safety juniors and the safety patrols.

Give the Children Every "Brake"

Traffic on the streets and roads of Ontario is growing heavier almost by the hour and, right now, as they are starting back to school in their thousands, we are in the most dangerous traffic period of the year for the children of the Province.

Inevitably, at this time of year the number of tragic traffic accidents involving children rises to painful heights. But it should not be, and need not be, inevitable. If the safety of our children is accepted as the job of the whole community, the toll of previous early autumn seasons can be reduced.

Last September, more children were killed by motor cars in Ontario than in other months. For the past ten years, September always has been a black month. Yet this grim threat to our children at the end of their school holidays can be alleviated, if all motorists, if all parents, if all school officials and teachers, and if every club and organization interested in community welfare, will combine in a concentrated effort to improve the special need for caution.

Everyone can help, for instance, by stressing these simple back-to-school safety precautions at every opportunity:

MOTORISTS: Give the kids the "brake"; yield them the right-of-way, and look out for them with special care in residential areas and school zones.

PARENTS: See that your children know the safe route to school—and that they know how to behave safely in traffic. Set them a good example in traffic behaviour.

OLDER BOYS AND GIRLS: Watch out for small children. They follow your example you know—so give them a good one to follow.

YOUNGER CHILDREN: Obey your traffic officers and school safety patrols. Play in safe places and see that the way is clear before stepping into the roadway. Always cross at an intersection—never in the middle of the block.
