MORE SUBSIDIES, LESS HOUSES, LESS FOOD

(The Scene at Shingwauk Farm) It is hard for many people in cities who work short hours to get enough of the food they want at present prices. Farmers who work long hours find it impossible to get enough help and equipment to lower their production costs. The food bill of many city families is so high, that, even with family allowances they find it difficult to finance houses which cost twice as much as they are worth. Farmers and landlords who provide food and houses are kept under control which lessen the supply of both. Planners now propose to ease the pain of inflation by food subsidies. A great many people, who will add to the cost of both food and houses will be employed for thirty-six and one-half hours a week, to pacify the public. The hard conditions will grow progressively worse and the increased suffering caused by wrong remedies will require stronger dosages of subsidy sedatives, which eventually will fail to work.

HIGHER RENTS

Government thinking generally has been that controls should remain as long as housing shortage remains acute, reports The Financial Post's Ottawa correspondent. The date generally in mind for relaxing control has so far been the fall of 1949. Any immediate move likely will be in the form of some slight increase in present ceiling, by way of pacifying owners who base their case on the fact that whereas rental ceilings have advanced but 20% over 1939, general costs are up 60%. So far no decision has been taken although the whole question is under study with the property owners.
