# Board Approves Lease of Grounds For Scout Hall

Acton School Board met in October session on Tuesday evening with Trustees, J. Chapman, N. Bowles, Dr. F. G. Oakes present and Chairman L. Lowell presided. The new members of the Board took the oath of office. The Secretary reported receipt of \$54 non-resident fees and \$783.07 from the Department of Education for the year's grants. The Secretary read the report of the Boiler Inspector, and other routine correspondence. Principal MacKenzie reported a shortage of desks in the senior grades. The Secretary was asked to secure half a dozen desks. The Kindergarten class now has an enrolment of 53 which was the capacity of the room. The Rotary Club offered to arrange for vocational guidance and take the pupils to visit industries and show a film. The Board approved of this arrangement. The Board approved of prizes of \$2 a month for the best attendance in the various grades. The money was used to purchase something required in the grade and had proven to be an incentive for better grade attendance. Accounts amounting to \$465.03 were passed for payment and the Secretary was empowered to assess the North Halton High School Board with their share of the maintenance costs for the month. The Board discussed and approved of a lease of land in the school grounds for placing a Scout Hall and the interests of the Board were to be protected in the terms of the lease. It was to be located on a section of the grounds not presently in use. It was decided to change the regular meeting of the Board to the first Thursday of each month.
