SKID ROW DERELICT NOW OFFICER IN SALVATION ARMY

This year a man was nominated for the "Citizen of the Month" award by a city which nine years ago committed him to an insane asylum for alcoholism and drug addiction.

Tom Crocker, a successful man of responsibility, became a confirmed alcoholic, lost his position and found himself a drifter on Detroit's Skid Row. From that time on, Tom's life was a veritable hell on earth. In and out of police courts, through one cure after another, he was finally locked up in an insane asylum a san incurable. Upon his release, still craving both drugs and drink, Tom was evicted from his cheap rooming house, and his only shelter was in tunnels, in caves or on park benches.

With both legs paralyzed, homeless and degraded, one day this man found his way to the Salvation Army Bowery Corps. Broke in health, without money for drink or drugs, Tom cried out in desperation: "Do you think your Jesus can save me? His extremity became God's opportunity. That night he was converted."

He eventually became Captain Tom Crocker, and for nine years has gone into the highways and byways and compelled men; who need a Saviour to come in and learn of a better way. Thousands of alcoholics have been rehabilitated and, by God's grace, many of them have been converted. Under the command of Capt. Tom Crocker there has been a splendid development of the Detroit Skid Row, which added an employment office, housing accommodations for 200 men, recreation facilities, and an infirmary staffed by responsible converts who stand as living witnesses to the effectiveness of the power of God and devoted workers.

This is just one story of what is happening in hundreds of places around the world every day of the year. The Army is really doing its part to help "others" will you do yours to help this noble cause during the Campaign now being held in Acton.
