County Assessor Reports To Halton Council

Brampton on November 4, at 3 p.m.

Council also gave their assent to granting the governor and guards at the jail a \$15 a month cost of living bonus as granted other civil servants in the province. Members felt the initial salary of these men, \$1,250 per year, was hardly sufficient for the important task they are asked to perform.

Council made a grant of \$100 to the St. John's Ambulance Appeal. Declaring she did not wish to be critical of the operation of the old People's home, Reeve Mary Pettit stressed the necessity of additional space to take care of the older people when they need that care.

She explained that it was high impossible to have applications for admittance granted, while the county was also paying hospital care for some who could be cared for in the county institution. The Reeve of Nelson thought a boarding home would alleviate the situation until extension plans could be made at the Brampton home.

"No elderly person in Halton should want for care", she stated, adding that council should make plans to locate such a boarding home.

Reeve William Higgins thought it would be worthwhile for the county to investigate a program to institute a home of its own. "Halton is growing and it may not be long until we are faced with that possibility," he declared.

Other members favored the idea adding that both counties were in progressive expansion which would soon require a larger institution.

"It's not a case of being critical but one of looking after those applicants now unable to go these for want of room" Mrs. Pettit observed.

On suggestion of Deputy Reeve George Currie, the matter was left in the hands of the Warden to suggest to the board, they procure property to care for at least 10 or 12 persons until extensions could be made on the present property.

Council gave two readings to a by-law regulating the construction of fences, erecting signs and placing of gasoline pumps on properties adjoining county roads.

It was explained the by-law after the second reading was to be presented to the Department of Highways for their approval. Following their consent the by-law would be read a third time before it would become law.

Accounts approved and ordered to be paid, included: Finance \$2,485.34; County Roads \$9,333.94; Printing, \$75.27; County Buildings, \$1,050.68; Hospitals, \$1,827.25; Agriculture and reforestation, \$1,910.20.

Council adjourned to meet on November 9th.

Free Chest Clinic In Halton Rural Areas

From Monday, October 25th to Friday, October 29th, the residents of the rural area of Halton County will have an opportunity for a free chest x-ray.

This is part of the Dominion-wide campaign for the control of tuberculosis and is, in part, financed by the purchase of Christmas seals.

It is a co-operative effort of the Halton County Christmas Seal Committee, the Ontario Department of Health, The Ontario Tuberculosis Association the Halton County Federation of Agriculture and the Halton County Health Unit.

A series of organization meetings have been held in all Townships and interested community groups will make a house to house canvass to explain to the people the need for a chest x-ray.

10 clinics in all will be held. The clinics are as follows:

Union School, Trafalgar (17 Ash), October 25th, 7.00 p.m.-10.00 p.m.
Kilbride, October 26th, 1.00 p.m.-5.00 p.m.

Brookville Hall, October 27, 1.00 p.m.-5.00 p.m.
Limehouse Community Hall, October 27th, 7.00 p.m.-10.00 p.m.
Norval Community Hall, October 28th, 1.00 p.m.-5.00 p.m.
No. 9, Boyne School, October 28th, 7.00 p.m.-10.00 p.m.
Palermo, October 29th, 1.00 p.m.-5.00 p.m.

At these clinics no appointment is necessary. Even though the canvasser may not call at your home, you are welcome to attend. There is no waiting. Over 100 per hour can be x-rayed at these clinics. There is no undressing. There is no charge to anyone.

Who should be x-rayed? Every adult should be done regardless of age. Even among very elderly people occasionally infectious cases of tuberculosis are found. Up to the level of 8th grade it is not considered necessary to x-ray children, since cases of tuberculosis of the lung are rarely found. However, if there has been any contact with a case of this disease, the child should be x-rayed. Children in 8th grade and above should be x-rayed since it is in this age group that the cases most frequently appear. Many people were x-rayed in the survey carried out in our towns last year. Have another x-ray of your chest done this year. A routine periodic x-ray is excellent insurance for your continued good health. Many firms, N.B.A. at their employees each year.

Why have an x-ray? Everyone should have a chest x-ray for two reasons. One is for your own protection, the other is for the good of the community. By x-ray tuberculosis is found in its earliest stages long before the individual is aware of his ill. When found at this stage the period of hospital care and loss of earning power is much reduced. If the individual goes on until he is ill enough to seek medical attention this period of stay in hospital will be greatly increased, and indeed it might be most difficult to cure the disease. By finding a case of tuberculosis early, the further spread of the disease from the patient to other persons in the community is prevented. Approximately 1000 Ontario citizens die each year with tuberculosis. They did because they only after serious physical breakdown
