BURLINGTON

Don McFarlane of Burlington high school, has been nominated for the Viscount Alexander trophy presented to the outstanding junior athlete in Canada each year.

The assessment for this year has been completed by Assessor Johnston, and according to figures obtained from the assessment roll the total assessment is an all time high, \$4,166,760, an increase of \$430,604 over 1947. The population of the town is 5,105, an increase over last year of 162.

OAKVILLE

Building permits issued in Oakville for the first eight months of the present year had a total value almost double that for the whole of last year. Figures released by Town Clerk Clarence H. Byers show a total of \$1,096,174, compared with \$535,000 in 1947. Resident building was \$781,095, compared with \$282,000 for the whole of 1947.

Oakville had the second lowest property fire loss, and loss per capita, of the five towns and villages of Halton County, according to a report on fire losses in Canada for 1947 issued by the Dominion Fire Commissioner's office. Oakville's total loss was \$1,895, and the per capita loss .46. Figures for the other communities are as follows: Acton, \$399, 21; Burlington, \$3,089, 1.08; Georgetown, \$3,120, 1.26; Milton, \$3,781, 1.99.—Record Star.
