### ACTON Y'S MEN HEAR STORY OF ARCTIC TRIP

Michael Beer, senior student attending the University of Toronto, described his experiences, north of the Arctic Circle at the regular dinner meeting of the Y's Men's Club, last Thursday. His father is Dr. Beer, of the chemistry department of Beardmore & Co., here.

Michael was selected by the Canadian government last summer to assist in establishing weather stations in the far Arctic. One great handicap to accurate weather analysis in Canada, he asserted, was the fact that weather stations in the north are over 500 miles apart, leaving great gaps where weather data is unobtainable.

Illustrating his points with photographs and colored slides, he described the hazards of the short Arctic summer, also the simple but satisfying life of the Eskimos.

Bob Parker, on behalf of the club presented gifts to Tom Jones and the VanGils brothers, for their assistance in installing and removing the dance floor from the Arena. This floor is now clear of debt, and, in a colorful note burning ceremony, the evidence of this former indebtedness ascended in smoke and flames.

### Additional Hydro Cut Brings More Local Restrictions

Will be Hour Black-out Monday to Friday—Industry Co-Operates to Keep Pay Envelopes Full

Last Friday, the H.E.P.C. of Ontario, advised the Acton Utilities Commission, that effective this week a further reduction of 1500 kw. daily must be made in local consumption. This was in line with a general further reduction in quotas throughout the province, made necessary by lack of rainfall in vital power-producing areas.

The Utilities Commission asked industry to meet with them on Monday night to see what could be done in view of this further drastic cut in quota. The meeting studied every possible means of saving, in an effort to avoid long and numerous blackouts and smaller pay envelopes. It was finally agreed that, even with many adjustments of hours and night shifts for industry and a daily black-out of one hour, the now reduced quota could not be met entirely. As a result, it was decided to make the best possible adjustment of hours and shifts for industry, have a blackout one hour, Monday through Friday from 4 to 5 p.m., and immediately petition the H.E.P.C. of Ontario for some relief to offset the balance of the quota.

A committee of four was appointed to make representation to the Provincial commission and on Tuesday visited officials of the H.E.P.C. in Toronto and put the Acton emergency morning, met again with the committee and agreed to give every consideration and some relief in view of the effort Acton is putting forth in the emergency.

Consequently it is now felt that if fullest co-operation is continued, no further adjustments or restrictions than those now in force will be necessary.

### FARM FORUMS START SEASON IN HALTON COUNTY

On November 1st, Farm Radio Forum got under way for the ninth consecutive year. Next year we'll be able to tell how many groups met in Halton County. We think this year is going to show a considerable increase in numbers over last year. And that is not only going to be true in Halton but it looks as if it will be the case all over Ontario, and maybe Canada.

For the information of any persons who may not know what the Farm Forum is: National Farm Radio Forum is a listening-and-discussion group project for the farm people of Canada. It is sponsored jointly by 3 Dominion-wide non-profit, and non-political organizations — the Canadian Association for Adult Education, the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. Last season 1,351 groups or Farm Forums met and reported regularly throughout the fall and winter months. Over 23,000 people belonged to these groups.

Halton County has never had a county Farm Forum rally. But one is now being planned by the county executive. Forums will be notified as to the date and place. If you have a Forum in your community, or if you would like to have one, or if you are just interested, you will be welcome at the rally.
