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**3000 Attend Plowing Match in Halton County**

Guests Packed Appleby Church For Banquet—List of Winners in Classes

Halton Plowmen's Association received many verbal bouquets on the occasion of the banquet held in the Appleby Church which brought to a conclusion one of the most successful matches ever staged by the Halton association. Over two hundred and sixty guests packed the Appleby Church to capacity. Dr. G. I. Christie, former president of the Ontario Agricultural College was the guest speaker and this veteran leader of Ontario Agriculture who was introduced by W. E. Breckon of Freeman, was in his old time form and delighted his audience with his dynamic message. The program also included delightful numbers by the Campbellville-Lowville Octette.

"The Halton Association has the most efficient board of directors and runs the best organized and best managed Match which I have ever visited," stated Winford Timbers, a veteran plowman of York County, who with N. G. McLeod of Galt, R.R. No. 7, were the two official judges of the day. The latter corroborated this statement and congratulated the Halton Board on its efficient and smooth running program throughout the day.

C. F. Picket, President of the Halton association, was the able chairman for the program which also included brief addresses by Warden Geo. Cleave, Stanley L. Hall, M.P.P., Herbert Berry of Valley Crest Farms, Palermo, who was the official judge of the Horse Show, and J. A. Elliott, past president of the Association.

Favoured with an ideal site on the Erwin Gunby farm at Tansley, coupled with almost perfect soil and weather conditions, between two and three thousand spectators followed the work of the fifty plow boys; inspected the fine display of farm machinery, chatted with their neighbours and friends, and in short, had a most enjoyable day. Among the competitors were top plowmen from the counties of York, Peel, Wellington, Wentworth, Brant and Waterloo, who vied in friendly rivalry with twenty-eight of Halton's crack mouldboard artists.

D. H. Hart of Hartholm Farms, Woodstock, ably discussed hay making and grass silage during the afternoon program. Mr. Hart while admitting there is much about this hay making business which still remains to be solved, gave his lengthy experience in a sound practical address. An excellent display of various quantities of baled hay with their respective analyses of protein, calcium and phosphorus, tied in with this feature of the program.

However, to come to the Plowing Match proper, Stan May of Hornby, who has come rapidly to the forefront in recent years won the Salada Tea Special and also the Bank of Commerce Special, emblematic of the best plowed ridge in the walking plow classes by a Halton contestant. In the six tractor classes Harold Pickett of Hornby had the best Halton ridge, and thereby won the Esso Champions Tractor Special for the second year in succession. John W. Pickett of Hornby won the Bank of Nova Scotia Trophy, also for the second time in succession, for the best tractor ridge by plowboys under 18 years. The Stirling and Dymess Special for the best ridge with Ford Ferguson equipment went to another Hornbyite namely Leonard Lister, while Elmer Bird, a fourteen year old from Esqueving Twp won the Geo. E. Elliott special to the youngest plowboy. Billie Grace of Freeman, and Ron King of Lowville, won the silver trays donated by the Royal Bank, Burlington and the Bank of Toronto, Burlington.
