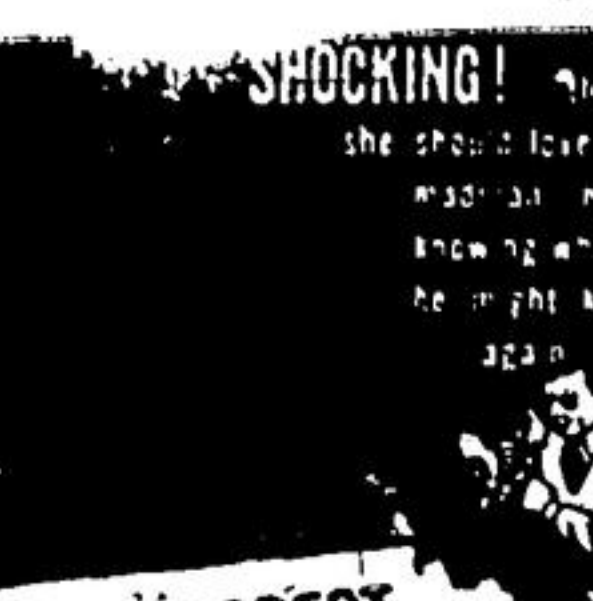

Rental Case In Halton Court On Tuesday

The validity of federal rental orders and controls were challenged Tuesday before Judge Archibald Cochrane in Halton County Court by Robert A. Reid, counsel for Joseph Adams of Burlington, who is appealing a \$500 fine for charging rent higher than that fixed by the Prices Board.

Adams was convicted last July of charging \$13 more than the fixed amount for rental of a downtown duplex in Burlington.

Adams charges in his appeal that informants, or convictions of offenses are ultra vires regulations, and that the powers, jurisdiction and authority of the Dominion Government and its rental boards became exhausted and ceased upon the termination of the Last World War No. 2. And that the controller or his officials had no legal or constitutional right to fix rentals.

The appeal arose from a conviction by Magistrate Langdon last July when it was found accused was charging rental in excess of the fixed amount. Following considerable argument by counsel in respect to the case testimony was given.

Douglas H. Cooper, tenant in Adams property, testified he paid his landlord \$50 a month not knowing the rental had previously been fixed by the board. It was not until W.P.T.B. officials had conducted an investigation was the rent reduced to \$37.00.

"When we rented the place he said the rent would be \$50 a month but his wife said \$50 would be enough," witness testified, adding that when the rent was paid receipts were given containing the words "paid in full". He said it was not until the rent was reduced did the receipts contain the amount in figures.

Both Joseph Adams and his wife denied the charges maintaining they had never charged above the \$37 fixation. Mrs. Adams said a \$50 cheque produced in court as one for paying rent, was made up of the \$37 rental and included the payment of several small loans made to Mrs. Cooper.

All evidence was heard at Tuesday's session. Argument by counsel was adjourned until January, at the request of the court.

5000 TREES IN COMMUNITY CENTRE



Another step in the final completion of Halton's Community Centre, took place last week when nearly three dozen farmers planted 5,000 trees to aid in the picturesqueness of the natural park at Lowville. Sponsored by Halton Federation of Agriculture the community centre was planned over a year ago as members cleared the natural amphitheatre in preparation of making the location one of the beauty spots in Halton County.

Since that time, ball playing fields were leveled, picnic tables and pavilion erected, a huge parking lot planned and the beautiful Twelve spanned a foot bridge.

Halton County officials officiated at the tree planting ceremony held last Thursday. In the upper photo, one group of workers are seen planting trees in furrows along the northerly ridge. Sheriff W.
