Milk -- and Liquor

It was reported last week that milk consumption in Ontario had dropped 11 per cent in recent months, the inference being that higher prices have forced people to cut down their purchases of milk and milk products.

At the same time it was announced that Canadians spent \$335 million on liquor last year. Consumption of liquor rose by 800,000 to 7.3 million proof gallons, and beer consumption rose from 147 to 168 million gallons, although the quantity of wine sold showed a decline from 55 to 52 million gallons.

It could possibly be said, and likely will be said, that it is a strange situation when Canadians can spend more money on liquor and less on milk. Farmers and distributors will wonder at a human nature which will not cut down on its liquor bill but, when the economic shoe starts to pinch, will cut down on the amount of milk which it provides for the children.

Yet this might be a superficial analysis. By and large, the people who spend money on liquor possibly do not vary their purchases of milk. Young, unmarried people, milk patrons, beverage rooms, liquor stores and cocktail bars who do not buy the same amount of milk as a family. The middle and upper classes may be able to spend more money on liquor and still buy the same amount of milk and milk products. It may be only the poorer class which continues to want as much beer and wine as usual, even if it means their children do not get as much milk.

But no matter how one explains it, the fact remains that Canadians are spending more money on liquor and less on milk. It should be the other way round. Better times should cause a big increase in the amount spent for milk and milk products. Children should be given the best of cream, instead of this mixture of cream and milk. If father can afford a bottle of \$2.50 imported wine, instead of \$1 bottle of native wine, the children should be getting better and more cream and milk. If spending power declines a bit, it should be liquor consumption which is reduced, not milk consumption.

These figures should cause Canadians to sit back and speculate as to whether or not we are following a sensible course in our purchases of milk and beer. - Chesley Enterprises.

MOVIE - TELEVISION BEGINS IN ENGLAND

Movie-television was launched in England, December 21st, at a picture house in Broomley near London. The audience first saw the BBC program from the Alexandra Palace, eighteen-miles away, followed by a transmission from the studio of movie-television (one of over six miles). In both cases the pictures were almost as bright as an ordinary film program and definition was excellent. Although cars were passing along the main roads only a few yards from the theatre, there was no sign of interference on the 16x12-foot screen. The Rank film group is prepared to install television in all its theatres in the United Kingdom if the Government gives its permission.
