TRAINING TEXTILE WORKERS IN SCOTLAND

-Production of woolen materials: is a traditional industry in Scotland, where it is regarded as both an art and a science. The Scottish Woolen Technical College in Gatashiels has already done much in -training technicians, but until recently there has been no opportunity in Scotland for training ordinary textile workers. Recently the management of the college decided to extend to workers the same educational opportunities as it extended to technicians; and textite workers from all over Scotland can now profit by them. Employers say they are prepared to grant workers three months or longer (if necessary) on full pay, for the necessary training . The College should provide training for 200 to 300 workers each year.
