And if that, you know -- the F.G. says so, and it has figures to prove it. I forget just what fraction of one per cent it had gone down but no doubt anyone who is curious could get that information from any government official. But do you know, as I heard the "good news" I wondered how many figures it cost the taxpayers to have that cost of living index tabulated and broadcast to the people?  
And after the decrease was announced what happened? Tea went up in price, coffee went up; likewise coal, milk, insurance premiums, motor and driving permits, and even the price of admission to our finest movie theatre. Also the cost of safety deposit boxes. There may also be a dozen other items that I have forgotten. It is hard to keep track of them all. Yes, margarine is supposed to be on the market but one grocer told me it would not be available, to small grocery stores for at least six months.  
Maybe we are short-sighted at Ginger Farm but we are quite in favor of margarine being available to those who can't afford to buy butter. I have a hunch there will always be a strong enough prejudice against margarine to insure a good market for butter. So why all the fuss? Maybe some of us forget that good old maxim -- "Live and let live". If all people, in all lands, would abide that simple rule, for living there would never be any wars, nor rumors of wars. But half the time we forget about the other fellow -- instead it seems to be "Each man for himself and the devil take the hindmost".

**The Sunday School Lesson**  
MONDAY, JANUARY 26  
MASTERING AND MEETING TEMPTATION  
Golden Text: For we have not a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weakness, but one whom in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sinning. Heb. 4: 15  
Lesson Text: Luke 4: 1-13  
Exposition -- I "The First Temptation."  
The moment of highest exaltation and clearest testimony is immediately succeeded by Satan's fiercest assault: true baptism with the Holy Spirit by the repeated temptations. Note well that it was the Spirit who led Jesus up into the wilderness. Mark says that the Spirit DROVE Him into the wilderness (Mk. 1: 12). The temptation was just as necessary a preparation for Jesus' work as was the baptism with the Holy Spirit (cf. Heb. 2: 17, 18, 4: 15, 16). Also note that Jesus' temptation was by "the devil", i. e., it came from without, not from within, and it came from a person and not merely from abstract sin. The personality of the devil is clearly taught here. It also teaches us his cunning, malignity and defeat. The reality and completeness of Jesus' human nature are plainly seen not only in that He was tempted, but also in His hunger, and also in the way in which the temptations were met and conquered. He met temptation as a man and conquered it by the Word of God and the power of the Holy Spirit. The preceding chapter is closed with a remarkable testimony to His deity; this chapter opens with an equally remarkable setting forth of His true humanity.  
The temptation covered the entire forty days (4: 1, 2). The three temptations here recorded are the climax of all and are typical Jesus met temptation in such a state of physical weakness as would make resistance to temptation most difficult and failure "most excusable"; but He did not fail, and so now no man can plead adverse circumstances as a justification for wrongdoing. Satan appealed to Jesus through the medium of an abject creature, the gratification of which could be perfectly right if it could be gratified by right means and methods. The temptation was most real because Jesus was most human and most hungry. The devil introduced this temptation as he did that of the garden, by suggesting a doubt of God's Word. God had said "This is my beloved Son," and Satan says, "IF THOU ART the Son of God." Here is where Satan always begins. He is great at putting "ifs" before God's statements. For Jesus to have done what Satan challenged Him to do would have been, (1) to have doubted God's Word and to have sought confirmation of it by a token, viz., His ability to perform a miracle; (2) to have taken Himself out from under those human conditions and limitations under which He had voluntarily placed Himself for our redemption (Phil. 2: 6-8; Heb. 2: 14).  
It would have involved the throwing up of His entire Mission, viz., the redemption of man by a Divine Person who had become real man. Essentially the same sin to which Satan tempted our Lord is committed by men today when they take themselves out from the sphere of sacrifice and of suffering in which it is necessary that one live if he is to have saving power with his fellow men. (3) It would have been to have distrusted God. Jesus would rely upon God to supply His needs in lawful ways. Jesus met this and the other temptations with the "sword" of the Spirit, which is the Word of God. (Eph. 6: 17) "It is written" was His constant reply.  
If the Second Temptation, 5-8, in the second temptation, the devil himself quoted Scripture but as usual he misquoted it. He left out an important clause (see Ps. 91: 11, 12). One needs to watch the devil's quotations of Scripture very closely, he is likely to quote nearly as it reads, but not exactly so. For Jesus to have accepted the devil's challenge would have been (1) to have exhibited doubt of God's Word by making an experiment to see if it would come out as God had said, that is, tempting God; (2) an act of spiritual pride. III. The Third Temptation, 9-13.  
In the last temptation, the devil comes out in his true colours; he seeks worship for himself. That is the very essence of devilism. The devil would have the Son of God render to him that worship being longed to God alone. Was there any temptation in this for Christ? In a sense, yes. Not that He for a moment yielded or was even confused by it, but Satan offered Him the dominion of the world by another road that the Cross. Our Lord Jesus descended with deathly agony the road that led through Gethsemane and over Calvary; but

He never left that road, and we must not (Matt. 16: 23, 24).  
The temptation was real but was utterly ineffective. We yield to essentially the same temptation when we seek that which God has for us by some other path than the one God appoints via Calvary. The three temptations correspond to the threefold temptation in Eden and appeal to "the lust of the flesh," "the vain glory of life," and "the lust of the eyes" (cf. Gen. 3: 6, 1 John 2: 16). Jesus was tempted in all points like as we are. Temptation could no response in Him; not for a moment, not even in thought, did He yield to sin. He could not sin because His whole will was set on pleasing God, and His whole delight was in doing it (cf. Ps. 40: 7, 8). He was absolutely "without sin" (more literally, "apart from sin," Heb. 4: 15). When the devil had gone, "the angels came and ministered unto him."
