HALTON JERSEY HERDS SET FINE PRODUCTION RECORDS

Jersey herds in the County of Halton continue to bring considerable fame to the County and since 1949 has set in, several cows have completed R.O.P. records.

In the herd of Kenneth Ella, Hornby, Ontario, the well-known Jersey cow, Grove Farm Theresa Doucet -147701- has completed a five-year-old record of 11,272 lbs. of milk, and 529 lbs. of fat in 305 days with a test of 4.77 per cent.

Several more Jersey cows have qualified in the Lindsale herd of Maurice C. Beaty, of Milton, Lindsale Draconis Blossom -155926- a daughter of his former herd sire, Brampton Draconis Royal, Superior rated bull, has a four-year-old record of 8,588 lbs. of milk, 490 lbs. fat in 305 days with a test of 5.71 per cent.

In the herd of Charles McKewen, Acton, Ontario, Knollview Gangster's Molly -166537- produced a senior two-year-old record in 305 days of 5,757 lbs. of milk, 342 lbs. of fat with test of 5.94 per cent. She is a granddaughter of Brampton Aster's Lassie, Grand Champion at the Royal Winter Fair, a few years ago.

41 CASES OF CHICKENPOX IN COUNTY THIS MONTH

In recent weeks there have been a considerable number of cases of chickenpox reported to the County Health Unit in Milton. The following are the number of cases reported per week since the first of the year in the Town of Milton.

Epidemics of this disease appear about every 2 to 4 yrs. Quarantine has been proven to be of little value. Therefore, by Provincial law, there is no longer any placarding of houses where cases occur and contacts are not kept home from school, etc.

From the above it would appear that the best way of preventing the spread of this disease is by early detection of the disease and separation of the child from others for a period of at least a week.
