### NOT VET SURE ABOUT POWER

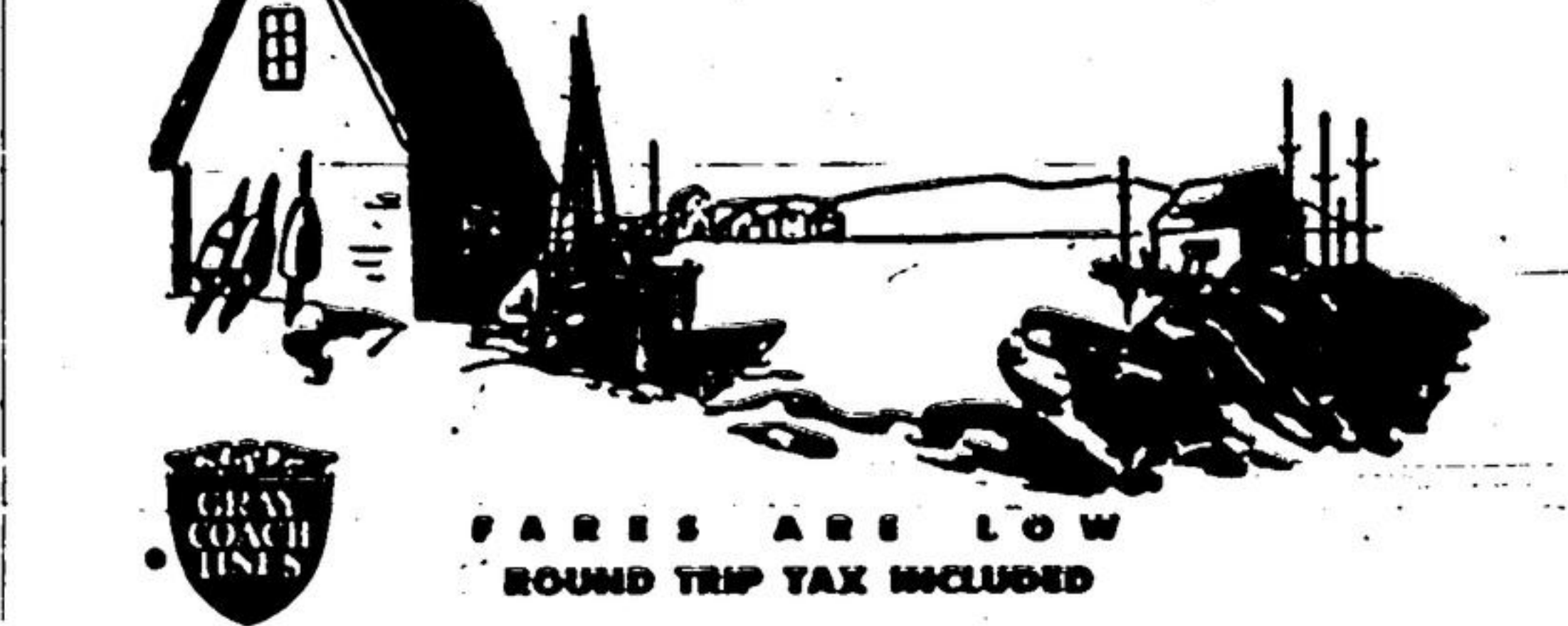
