Harold Trimble Driver Thrown from Cab as Train Struck 12 Ton Load

A Million truck driver and father of four children, liarold Trimble, miraculously escaped duath Monday afternoon when -hts heavy tractor-trailer was involved in level crussing crash, on the Hase lane, near Milton Brick Company

The crash occurred at about 215 in the afternoon between the truck and a fast Chicago-Turonto easthound flyer, Provincial Constable J A McNiven reported He said the trailer heavily laden with nearly 12 ton of brick was caught by the engine and carried down the tracks some forty pards The carriage of the trailer was carried another fifty saids farther While the trailer was demolished, the cab which had been dragged considerable distance was not hadly dam-

" It was lucky," were his first words, adding he had just left the Milton Brick Company plant loaded with 4,000 brick on the trailer "I noticed the train when it was about SW feet away, just as the ab of the truck straddled the tracks. My first thought was to got the call off the tracks, I was travelling in low gear, about five miks an hour, up the grade approaching the tracks, and just as the rab was ricar the engine crashed into the trailer," he re-

"The next thing I remember, was sitting on the ground with my arm reating on the running board of the cab, holding my head I can't realize how I came out of it It might have been a different story if the cab had turned over

The regulations in effect re water heaters and proning, etc., are rescinded as requested by the local manufacturers.
