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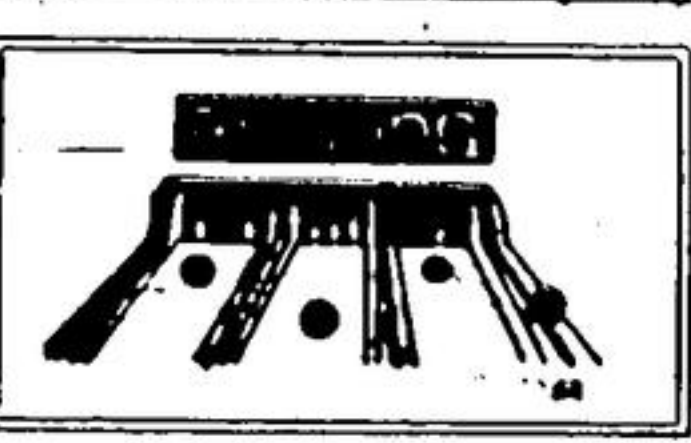
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Induction Services at Knox Church For New Minister

(Continued from Page One) In the work of Christ." He impressed the fact that, while the ministry is primarily and secondarily a teaching task, yet the servant of God must not yield to the temptation which overcame the disciples on the Mount of Transfiguration. He must bear the burdens and share the joys of his flock. Sacraments, so important in the world today, is more and more dangerous than communism, he affirmed. Therefore, while the minister must not compromise, yet he must realize that, allowing the Spirit of God to speak to him, he can, with gentleness, meekness, patience and humility, be in the world yet not of it. Rev. Hugh Cleghorn of Preston then addressed the congregation basing his remarks on the first ten stanzas of the second chapter of Virgil's Aeneid. All members of the church, he declared, belong to the priesthood, also. It is the duty of all Christians to make sacrifices and to seek to bring others to a knowledge of Christ. They must be submissive to the minister's teaching and pastoral care and co-operative in prayer and service. The choir, under the direction of Mr. E. A. Hanson, rendered the anthem, "The Gates of Heaven," with Miss Nella Huzzell as soloist. Rev. T. M. Bryan of Duff's Church, "Pustinch," clerk of the Presbytery, presented the record book for Mr. Armstrong's signature. Rev. Mr. MacNeil of Nassagaweya then moved that Mr. Armstrong's name be put upon the roll of Guelph Presbytery and the motion was seconded by Mr. Carmichael. At the close of this part of the evening's proceedings, Mr. Alex. K. Mann, Clerk of Session, and Mrs. Mann, Mr. Albert Robinson of the Board of Managers and Mrs. Robinson and Rev. F. Williamson, the Moderator, formed a receiving line at the front of the church and presented the congregation to Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong. All then repaired to the basement where the ladies had spread the tables with a bountiful lunch and an hour of social fellowship was enjoyed. Rev. L. Pickering of the United Church and Rev. W. G. Laxton, B.A. of St. Alban's Anglican Church, expressed friendly greetings. Rev. R. Forbes Thomson, B.A., M.A., D.D. of MacNab Street Church, Hamilton, former pastor of Acton congregation and classmate of Mr. Armstrong, expressed his pleasure at the happy circumstances which had occasioned this visit and Rev. F. Williamson, as Moderator, also expressed his satisfaction. Before departing, little Miss Anne Maplelen presented Mrs. Armstrong with a spray of spring flowers.

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County Council Approves of Bounty Paid for Foxes

(Continued from Page One) area to that of the North-Halton High School Area Board. Many ratepayers close to Milton argue it is unfair to ask their children to attend high school at Oakville when one is situated at Milton. Reviewing work of the Halton Health Unit for the past year, Dr. James M. Mather told council it was most successful. He said 1,111 children were examined by school medical officers in primary schools while 877 high school students were examined, under the school medical services. A total of 5,374 immunization procedures were carried out by his department in Public Health Nursing. 4,065 visits were made to 2,879 cases and 5,258 inspections of school children were made. Under sanitation and food control, 2,115 inspections and visits were made, 106 complaints investigated and 1,490 samples were sent to laboratories. In the financial statement expenditures for the Health Unit amounted to \$46,987.01 for 1948. Receipts totalled \$46,672.45 which included a dental grant of \$1,203.52, and an equal grant from the Province of Ontario of \$20,600 to that of the County of Halton for the same amount. Cash on hand at the first of the year was \$2,343.23. Council approved of a resolution from Peterborough county asking the department to increase the bounty on wolves from \$25 to \$40 and that the Department subsidize the counties to the extent of fifty per cent of this cost. In response to a communication from the Municipality of Acton advising the resignation of their representative on the North Halton High School Area Board, they also asked to have an additional representative named to the board. Reeve T. Jones explained it was too much of a load to ask one representative to shoulder for his municipality. A letter from the High School Board also asked that two new members be appointed to the Board. G. A. Dill, Acton, was re-appointed and H. E. Batkin, Esq., was appointed to the North Halton High School Area Board. Other appointments made included George Cleghorn to the Tree Conservation committee, Rev. T. Jones to the County Board of Health, E. M. Headhead as Weed Inspector for 1949, Corn Harer Inspector, W. Thompson, Esq., Harvey Hunt, Nelson, Lewis Patterson, Trafalgar, R. J. Anderson, Nassagaweya, John Armstrong and William Vansickle and J. Wilcockson to act as a committee representing council to assist the building committee for the Home for the aged at Brampton, during the present expansion program. A by-law was approved, jointly with one previously approved by Peel county council increasing the salary of the Farm Superintendent at the Halton-Peel Home for the Aged, from \$1000 to \$1200 a year. Council also approved of continuing payment of cost of living bonus to all officials and attendants. A resolution was approved asking the Warden and Treasurer to petition the Minister of Highways that Halton spend \$118,225.01 on the county road system during 1948, and to ask a statutory grant be made as provided by the Highway Improvement Act. Reeve F. W. Chambers of Oakville, asked council's assistance toward the resurfacing of Dundas Street in his municipality. He told members his council were faced with considerable improvements on the Main Street and as Dundas Street was a connecting link between the township as well as the continuation of a county road, he thought assistance should be given. He said a meeting was being arranged with a member of the Department of Highways, and asked the county roads committee to be present at the meeting. E. W. Smith, Reeve of Burlington objected to the county giving any assistance to a municipality. "If they give it in this case, Burlington will certainly ask for something too. If this council does something for one municipality it should be prepared to do something for another," he declared. Members approved of a grant of \$125 for the school forestry competition for 1949. The distribution of trees was left in the hands of the Public School Inspector. Tenders were awarded to the Gazette Printing Co. Burlington, for printing 100 copies of Auditor's reports at \$1.70 per page; 125 copies of minutes and by-laws at \$1.75 per page. Grants approved included: Salvation Army \$200; Canadian National Institute for the Blind \$300; Music Festival Association \$100. Memberships in various organizations included, Ontario Re-forestation Association; Association of Managers for Homes for Aged; Association of Assessing Officers; Ontario Association of Rural Municipalities; Ontario Trustees and Ratepayers association.
