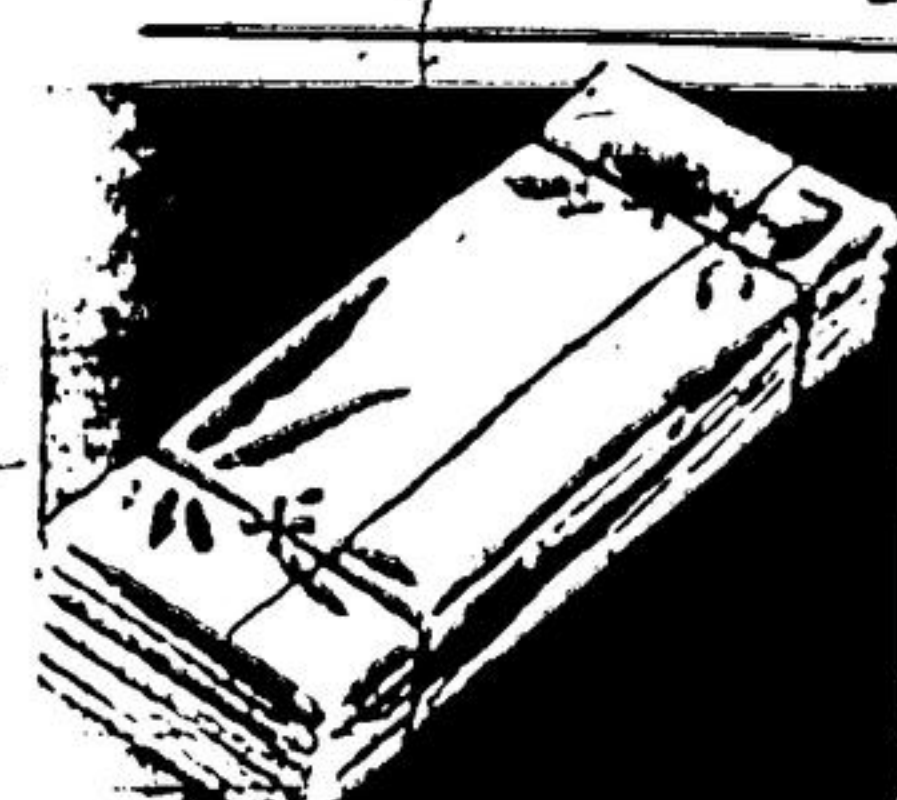

The Sunday School Lesson

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 13

FACING CHALLENGE AND OPPOSITION

Golden Text — Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good Rom 12: 21.

Lesson Text — Mk. 2: 3-8, 16-18: 1-4

Exposition — I. Jesus Honors Faith and Answers Criticism, 2: 3-8.

Jesus' sermon was interrupted by a case of dire distress brought to Him by four men, whose faith and earnestness would not be stopped from getting into His very presence. It required four men to get the one man to Christ, but it is worth the most persistent effort of four men to get one man to Jesus, and it often requires it. They brought the man to Jesus because there was no one else who could help. It took much persistence and scheming and toil to get the man to Jesus, but they never gave up until the man was at Jesus' feet. Jesus could be reached now, provided they were earnest enough to overcome the difficulties, and they were.

It was because of their faith that Jesus did what they sought. Their faith was a faith that could be seen: "Jesus saw their faith." True faith always can be seen. It materializes in works (Jas. 2: 18). Nothing is more needed today than a faith that has legs and hands and feet. Their faith was simply the absolute confidence that Jesus could and would save their friend (Luke 7: 50; 8: 48; 18: 41, 42). Jesus forgave the man's sins before He healed his palsy. The need of forgiveness was a sorer and deeper need than the need of healing, and sin must be gotten rid of before sickness can. If we would remove misery, we must first remove sin (Jas. 13: 39).

As always, so in this case, the professional faultfinder was present, and he was a high ecclesiastic scribe (Matt. 23: 2). The scribes were there to find something to

criticize (Luke 5: 17; Jno 5: 16), and they found it. The real secret of their hostility was envy (Mk 15: 10; Jno. 12: 19). They made a very heavy and very common charge against Jesus: "He blasphemeth" (Mk 14: 64; Jno 10: 33). Their reasoning was right up to a certain point; no one but God can forgive sins, and if Jesus was not God He was a blasphemer. Granted the Unitarian conception of Jesus and the scribes were right and his execution justifiable. But if Jesus is God, then it is the scribes who are the blasphemers. Jesus demonstrated to His startled accusers that He was divine and had power to forgive sins by reading their secret thoughts (2 Chron. 6: 30; Jer 17: 9, 10; Pa. 139: 1, 2). Then He gives another proof, heals the palsied man. He wishes men to "know that the Son of God hath power on earth to forgive sins." So He performs an act that we can see and which demands divine power for its accomplishment.

II. Physician of Souls, 2: 16, 17.
Levi made a great feast at his house (Luke 5: 29). Jesus attended this gay party. Levi's purpose was evidently not to display his wealth. He sought to get hold of his old business and friends. He succeeded. "Many publicans and sinners sat down with Jesus." Jesus directed the conversation quickly into Gospel channels. The scribes and Pharisees were around as usual to find fault. It did look odd, at first sight, that One who was so pure and holy, and who taught such lofty ethics, should make friendships among the abandoned and the vile; but Jesus Himself gives the solution of this enigma. "They that are whole have no need of a physician, but they that are sick." Where then, is the Church's true place? Jesus came to call sinners. He has no invitation of grace for a righteous man. Before a man can get anything from Jesus' hand, he must take his proper place, that of a sinner at Jesus' feet; then he gets all (Luke 18: 9-14; 1 Tim. 1: 15). Blessed is the sinner who hears the gracious call of Christ to repentance (Ac. 2: 38; 36: 18; Luke 15: 7, 10). If the sinner turns a deaf ear to this call, there is no more hope (Luke 13: 3).

III. Mercy in the Presence of Malice, 3: 1-6

"It is lawful to do good on the Sabbath day" (Matt 12: 12). Mercy and love are more than divine appointment. God will have mercy and not sacrifice (Matt 12: 7). Love is the divinest thing in the universe (1 Jno. 4: 8). Therefore the demands of ceremonies, even though divinely appointed, must give way before the activities and exigencies of love, which is itself divine. Lower law must yield to higher law. The Pharisees themselves acted upon this principle where it concerned sheep (Mat. 12: 11), but not when it concerned men. They had not learned that a man is of much more value than a sheep. Though the Pharisees were silenced, they were not satisfied. They went out and took council how they might destroy Him: very religious but murderers at heart. The method of the cure was deeply significant: He commanded the man to do what quite likely it was naturally impossible for him to do (v. 5) but with the will to obey came the power to act. Jesus Christ often commands the impossible but if we will just believe Him, He will give the power to do the impossible (Mk. 9: 23). The command was simply a test of faith.

GEORGETOWN

With 1000 reserved seats sold in advance and the rush seats well filled, the Skating Follies presented by Georgetown Girl Pipe Band last Friday was an outstanding success. It was the most elaborate carnival ever seen in Georgetown featuring green painted ice, a special dressing room built on the ice at the far end of the arena, decorations, spotlights and all the elements of a professional show.
P. B. Harrison, was appointed treasurer and James F. Evans, secretary of Georgetown Board of Education at a special meeting last Wednesday at the Public School. The positions carry salaries of \$250 and \$200 respectively.
The annual meeting of the Esqueping Agricultural Society was held on Saturday afternoon in the Municipal Building. While the Georgetown Fair enjoyed the best year in the history of the society, it was unfortunate that a deficit of \$340.00 had to be shown on the year's business.—Herald

BURLINGTON

After negotiating with the teaching staff of the High School, who placed before the Board in December last a request for increased salaries, the Board has made salary adjustments totalling ten per cent. This will mean an increase of between \$500 and \$600 over the salaries paid last year. We understand that the demands of the teachers were for a higher increase in their request, but that the Board did not feel they were able to obligate themselves to any further amount at the present time.
