Mrs. Van Sickle Sr., mother of Mr. William Van Sickle suffered a heart attack at his home here last Friday. We wish her a speedy recovery.





Terminating the ten-game intermediate schedule, Acton's unpredictable Tanners scratched through to a 3-4 decision over Bridgeport Vets at Heepeler Memorial Arena last Thursday night consolidating their fifth place position in front of over 1,000 mildly approving fans. In a wide-open contest that developed into a net-minder's nightmare, Tanners inflicted the fourth defeat of the season on Vets who share second place with Weston as the loop went down to the wire.  
 The tilt could have been reminiscent of the previous 38-penalty fixture in Acton, as officials imposed 22 penalties—12 to the Tanners and the remainder to Vets — if it hadn't been for the 'clamp-down' tactics of the two officials. They banished players on both teams on the slightest excuse, casting a dark complexion on a tilt which had nothing more than the customary exchange of heavy checks to mar it.

In addition, Watkins and Sheppard awarded one of the strangest goals ever seen in intermediate circles to the Tanners in the first period as they laboured under a 2-1 deficit. The goal was attributed to Ben Bayliss who fired a screened shot directly at the wide open net while Tanners pressed hard for the equalizer. The release, appeared to go in the net but amazingly the puck was discovered in-play at the extreme edge of the net. Incredible, Bayliss resumed play and didn't accept the referee until the next toot when he investigated the possibility of some slip-up on the goal judge's part. To his surprise he found a gaping hole in the cordage that the puck evidently had passed through caroming off the back boards and consequently into play again.  
 Despite the hostility of the Vets, officials conferred with the goal judge after Bayliss pointed out the large sized rent and then resolutely awarded a tying goal to Acton and besides, cancelled a penalty they had previously awarded to Goy after the disputed goal was scored. Although it came in somewhat mystical circumstances, the marker eventually proved to be the winning margin.  
 The outcome of the game meant nothing to the position of either club. However, incidents like the foregoing marked play throughout. There were many and heated arguments that continually disrupted play.  
 Play was tuned to full throttle all the way with little defensive hockey. Evans and Woolner had to stop shots galore as attacking units repeatedly bore down on them through a leaky defense.  
 Kentner, Durant and Evans shone for Acton with Bayliss playing sparkling game as well. Durant and Kentner potted the prettiest goals of the night as they weaved in close to beat Woolner.
