GEORGETOWN

Announcement is made this week of the appointment of R. H. Ireland to the management of the Canadian Bank of Commerce branch in Brantford. Mr. Ireland will leave later this month to take over his new position. It came as a great shock to his friends in town to hear of the sudden death early Saturday night of John S. (Jack) Tost Stricken with a severe heart attack. He was taken to the office of Dr. C. V. Williams, where medical aid proved unable to help him. Bill Armstrong, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Armstrong of town, has graduated from the Spartan School of Aeronautics at Tulsa, Oklahoma, and is home at present for a short vacation. Bill, who served as a ground crew member of the RCAF in the war, enrolled at the school following his discharge. He is now qualified in maintenance operation for airlines—Herald.

OAKVILLE

Plenty of H2O for Oakville and district for many years to come, is the objective of the big construction program that the Oakville Water and Light Commission starts this spring. While the new equipment will start off in a modest way pumping five million gallons a day (as compared with the present flow of one and three-quarter million), it will make possible an ultimate pumping capacity of twelve million gallons daily.

Traffic lights at five street intersections, and a two-way radio system for the Oakville police department were recommended by Chief of Police John Derry in his report for 1948.

The badly mauled body of Joseph Parks, 55-year old employee of the Oakville Backet Company, was found early Thursday morning on the north side of the C.N.R. track about eight feet west of the western end of the Sixteen Mile Creek bridge. The man had evidently been struck by a train.

As soon as work now authorized is completed, Oakville's debt-service debt will jump from \$27,000 to \$203,000. This will raise the tax rate by 13 mills, or approximately 26%—Herald Star.

The Sunday School Lesson

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 27

STANDARDS FOR KINGDOM CITIZENS

Golden Text: "Seek ye first his kingdom and his righteousness." Matt. 6: 33. Lesson Text: Matt. 5: 1-12; 7: 24-27. Exposition: I. Blessedness of Heaving, 5: 1-12.

In the passage of Scripture Jesus answers the great question that man is ever asking: How to be happy. Jesus points out eight classes whom God pronounces happy. They are not those whom the world esteems happy. Indeed they are in part those whom the world esteems most unfortunate. But time has justified, and eternity will more abundantly justify the declarations of Christ.

The first class are "the poor in spirit," i.e., the lowly in heart, those who recognize their need and are contrite and humble in spirit (cf. Ps. 34: 18; 51: 17; Prov. 29: 23; Isa. 57: 15; Eccl. 2: 2; Phil. 3: 3). There is the kingdom of heaven. The goal of this present evil age belongs to the self-assertive and self-seeking, the god of the coming age belongs to the self-realizing and self-adoring. The door of the kingdom is only open to those who realize their utter moral poverty and humble themselves in the dust (Jas. 4: 9, 10; 1 Pet. 5: 6; Luke 14: 11, 13). The spirit of the twentieth century is utterly opposed to the poverty in spirit here described.

The world's estimate is "Blessed are those who are not called to mourn, those who have a life of merriment and no sorrows." But Jesus says, "Deep sorrow is one of the greatest blessings of the life that now is." All who have learned to know the deeper joys that are in Christ have been led into them through great heartaches. The reason why those who mourn are happy is because "they shall be comforted." It is "the God of all times" (2 Cor. 1: 3-4).

The third class who are happy are the "meek," i.e., the humble gentle and lowly as distinguished from the self-assertive and contentious and harsh (1 Cor. 4: 21; 6: 1; Eph. 4: 2; Tim. 2: 23; Titus 3: 2). The world's thought is that there is no chance for the meek man in a selfish, bustling age like this, and that his gentle voice can never be heard amid the universal clamor. Jesus says, "They shall inherit the earth" (cf. Ps. 37: 11, Isa. 57: 13).

"Blessed are they that do hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled." There are few sweeter promises in the Bible than this. How dissatisfied God has made some of us with our present attainments in holiness! How we cry to God for something more, something higher, deeper, more perfect like Him, between whom and ourselves we see so wide a difference! Jesus says, "you shall be FILLED." But if one is satisfied with present attainment there is nothing more for him (Luke 1: 53). "The merciful" Mercy is that genuine loving-kindness toward the needy that leads to helpful action in their behalf. The man who helps others in their distress (Luke 1: 68; Ps. 41: 1). On the other hand he who has a deaf ear to the cry of the needy will find that God has a deaf ear when he cries to Him (Pr. 21: 13; Matt. 18: 23-25).

The next happy ones, "the pure in heart." There is the supreme blessedness, "they shall see God." God is infinite beauty and infinite glory in personal manifestation. The joy of beholding the greatest masterpiece of art, the most wondrous landscape, the face of most matchless beauty is nothing to the joy of gazing into the face of God. The pure in heart and they alone have this ineffable joy (Heb. 11: 14). A sinful heart makes a blind eye. The pure in heart already see God (Jno. 14: 18-21, 23), but "in glass darkly," in the coming day "face to face" (1 Cor. 13: 12).

"Peacemakers." Their blessedness is because "they shall be called the sons of God" (R.V.). The God of the Bible is the "God of peace" (Rom. 15: 33; 16: 20; Phil. 4: 9; Heb. 13: 20). Surely then the peacemakers are justly called His sons. On the other hand, one who stirs up strife must be sons of the devil. All discord and hate has entered the world through the devil. The wisdom that leads to bitter envying and strife "is earthly, sensual, devilish."

In this way the kingdom of heaven becomes ours. This is the path "the prophets were before" us and the apostles and Jesus Himself, trod to glory. No one will ever enter the kingdom in any other way (Ac. 14: 22). Men consider themselves most "fortunate" when "reproached" and "persecuted" and "all manner of evil against" them for Christ's sake, but Jesus says that it is the time to "rejoice, and be exceedingly glad." These things are the cost of great reward in heaven" (Rom. 8: 17, 18; 2 Cor. 4: 17).
