sewers, at \$450, to add to the county's reforestation scheme.

Letters ordered to be filed included a resolution from Prince Edward County protesting the dissolution of the Old Age and Pensions Boards in each county. Another from Lincoln County who sought to have a 53 cent increase for wards in hospital, to be taken from the new amusement tax. The Clerk was instructed to inform the Milton Lumber Company the lot adjoining the County Health Unit was not for sale.

John T. Armstrong, Georgetown chairman of the Educational committee was delegated to attend the Ontario Trustees and Ratepayers Association convention being held in Toronto on April 18-20.

E. W. Smith said if delegates were appointed they should attend and report back to council. "In the past delegates have gone to these affairs and that is the last we heard of it. It is valuable for us to spend money here if no report is made," he declared.

Some members felt there was a duplication in grants when a request for \$200 was tabled. They said grants were made by municipal councils and many of these organizations also asked for tag-days and other ways to raise money. Mr. VanSickle was successful with his resolution to have the clerk advise each of the municipalities of all grants made to these organizations by county council. He thought by this method the ratepayers would not be called on to pay for this duplication. Reeve P. W. Chambers advised it would be different if the municipalities were making the grant for an organization operating in the municipality.

Three Meetings Are Required Before Appointment Is Made

Acting on instructions of Council, the Reeve and Deputy-Reeve met with the Chairman and Mr. Saunders of the School Board, at the office of the clerk on January 24th, to make necessary arrangements toward the appointment of a clerk and secretary.

Mr. Wm. H. Hindley was elected chairman of the meeting and it was decided to advertise the positions.

The Council met with the School Board in Rockwood School on February 16th to consider applications for the positions of Clerk and Secretary. Reeve D. D. Gray was elected Chairman. Applications for the position of Clerk were received from Messrs. P. R. Peavoy, E. E. Hamill, O. H. Parker, S. S. Royce, F. T. Haylias; Mrs. H. Mack; and from Mr. G. A. Franck as Collector.

The meeting failed to agree on the appointment of any one person to the joint positions of Clerk and Secretary and the Chairman of the Board later advised the Council that the secretary of the Board had been granted an increase of salary and allowed to withdraw his resignation.

Council ordered that the positions of Clerk, Treasurer, Collector and Relief Officers be advertised.

Council met in the Town Hall, Rockwood, at 1.30 on March 7th with all the members present and the Reeve in the chair. At the request of the Rockwood Trustees, the contract with Mr. C. Harris for garbage collection was renewed for one year at the existing rate of \$775.00 per annum.

Moved by Councillors Cox and Hutchison and carried. That we request the Assessor to arrange with the South Wellington Registrar to furnish records of sales of properties in the Township, on the usual basis, the costs to be paid by the township and the records to be the property of the township.

Applications for all vacant township positions were received from Messrs F. T. Haylias, E. E. Hamill, S. S. Royce, O. H. Parker and D. J. Cramp.

Moved by Deputy-Reeve Benjamin and Councillor Cox and carried, that S. S. Royce be appointed Clerk, Treasurer, Collector and Relief Officer as of May 1st, 1949, at a salary of \$100.00 per month for the eight months of 1949, subject to a bond of \$5,000.00 to be produced to Council on April 4th, 1949.

Instructions were given for the re-installation of the floodlight at the Cenotaph.

Accounts passed for payment amounted to \$201.23 and Council adjourned to April 4th at a time to be set by the Reeve.
