Fortunately our move proved to be correct and all we have to do now is to curb the indignation of several who accepted our preliminary statement.

The Sunday School Lesson

SUNDAY, MARCH 20

GROWING IN DISCIPLINE

Golden Text - Every one who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be opened. Luke 11: 10.

Lesson Text - Mk 6: 30-32; Luke 11: 14, 9-13

Exposition - Seeking Quiet and Rest, Mk 6: 30-32.

The disciples acted very wisely in telling Jesus "all things," both "what they had done" and "what they had taught." If we did that each day we would do fewer foolish things and teach less nonsense. Jesus lives continually in a crowd (Matt 4: 24, 25; 8: 1, 12, 15, 13, 2, 14, 15, 30, 31). There is nothing more wearisome than a crowd, unless the heart is full of love. But when we grow so tired of the crowd, let us remember how the Master's life was spent in the incessant coming and going of the crowd that had driven Jesus to seek this seclusion (v. 31). But He did not thus escape them. They followed Him. And how did He feel? "He welcomed them" (Luke 9: 11, R.V.). Wonderful love! His own need sinks out of sight as He beholds theirs. The desire and need of rest are forgotten and the whole day is spent in teaching and healing (Luke 9: 11, 12).

If Jesus Teaches Disciples to Pray, Luke 11: 1-4.

There is nothing regarding which we need more teaching than regarding prayer (Rom. 8: 26; Jas. 4: 3). None can teach how to pray better than Jesus. It was seeing Him pray Himself that led the disciples to ask Him to teach them to pray. If we can only learn to pray as He prayed, we will have mastered the secret of prevailing prayer (John 11: 42). Jesus is just as ready to teach us today through His Holy Spirit as He was to teach the disciples by word of mouth (Rom 8: 26, 27). This is generally spoken of as the Lord's Prayer, but the Lord's Prayer is found in John 17. This is rather the Disciples' Prayer.

The opening words of the prayer teach that God is the Father of all believers in Christ and that they are all brethren. The place of God's peculiar abode is heaven (cf. Ps 113: 5, Isa 66: 1, Ps 11: 4, Dan 2: 28, Matt 10: 32, 3: 17, Ac 1: 9, 10). True prayer always puts the hallowing of God's name before all else (cf. John 17: 1). All the rights of the entire finite race of men sink into nothing before the rights and glory of the infinite God. Next to the glory of God's name comes the triumph of God's kingdom, the establishment of God's reign first in our own hearts, then in the hearts of others, then in open manifestation throughout the world (cf. Isa. 2: 2-5; Dan 2: 44; 7: 27; Rev 11: 15, 19; 6: 20, 4). Before the Kingdom can fully come, the King must come. We do well to pray for the coming of the King as well as the coming of the Kingdom (Rev. 22: 20).

The third petition indicates submission to the will of God (Luke 22: 42), delight in performing the will of God (John 6: 38; Eph. 6: 6), sanctification in our own lives (1 Thes. 4: 3), and the desire that the will of God be the law of all the earth. The fourth petition is to be taken first of all literally as applying to the necessities of the body. It is right to speak to God about these (Phil. 4: 6). The measure of temporal things that we should desire is enough each day for that day. The petition is one which like trust that delights to get its food each day from the Father's own hands. Jesus lived as He prayed (cf. Matt. 6: 34; 1 Tim. 6: 8, 9; Ex. 16: 15-22). The fifth petition is not the prayer of the unrepentant sinner for the forgiveness of the sins that are destroying him, but the prayer of the saved child of God for the forgiveness of sins that are hindering his communion with the Father. If we are to enjoy the forgiveness that brings unbroken fellowship with God, we must on our part forgive those who have injured us. Nothing more surely destroys communion than an unforgiving spirit (cf. Matt. 6: 14, 15; Mk. 11: 25). The fact that we forgive others is not the ground upon which God forgives us, but it is the condition of our enjoying the forgiveness (Eph. 1: 7, 4: 32). The prayer for pardon is put first of the prayers for spiritual blessings because there is no blessing unless there is pardon. God does not tempt men (Jas. 1: 13), but He does bring men into places where they are tempted (Job 1: 12, 2; 6; Mk. 1: 12, 13). He never suffers us to be tempted above that which we are unable to bear (1 Cor. 10: 13). But the man who is humble and has an adequate conception of his own weakness will constantly pray, "bring me not into temptation."

III. The Power of Impunity, 9-13.

The central thought of this parable is plain enough, namely that if we do not get what we ask of God the first time we ask, to keep on praying until we do (cf. Luke 18: 1-8). The word translated "impunity" means, literally, "shame-

lessness". God delights in that persistent faith, the holy boldness, that will not be put to shame nor take no for an answer (cf. Matt 13: 21-23). In verse 9 there are three commands and three promises. Obtaining the promises is conditioned upon obeying the commands. Men do not obtain because they do not ask (cf. Jas. 4: 2). They do not (and because they do not seek they do not have the door opened to them because they do not knock. By piling up words (ask, seek, knock), Jesus sets forth the need of earnestness and downright persistence in prayer. How few people pray things through. We stop short just too soon.

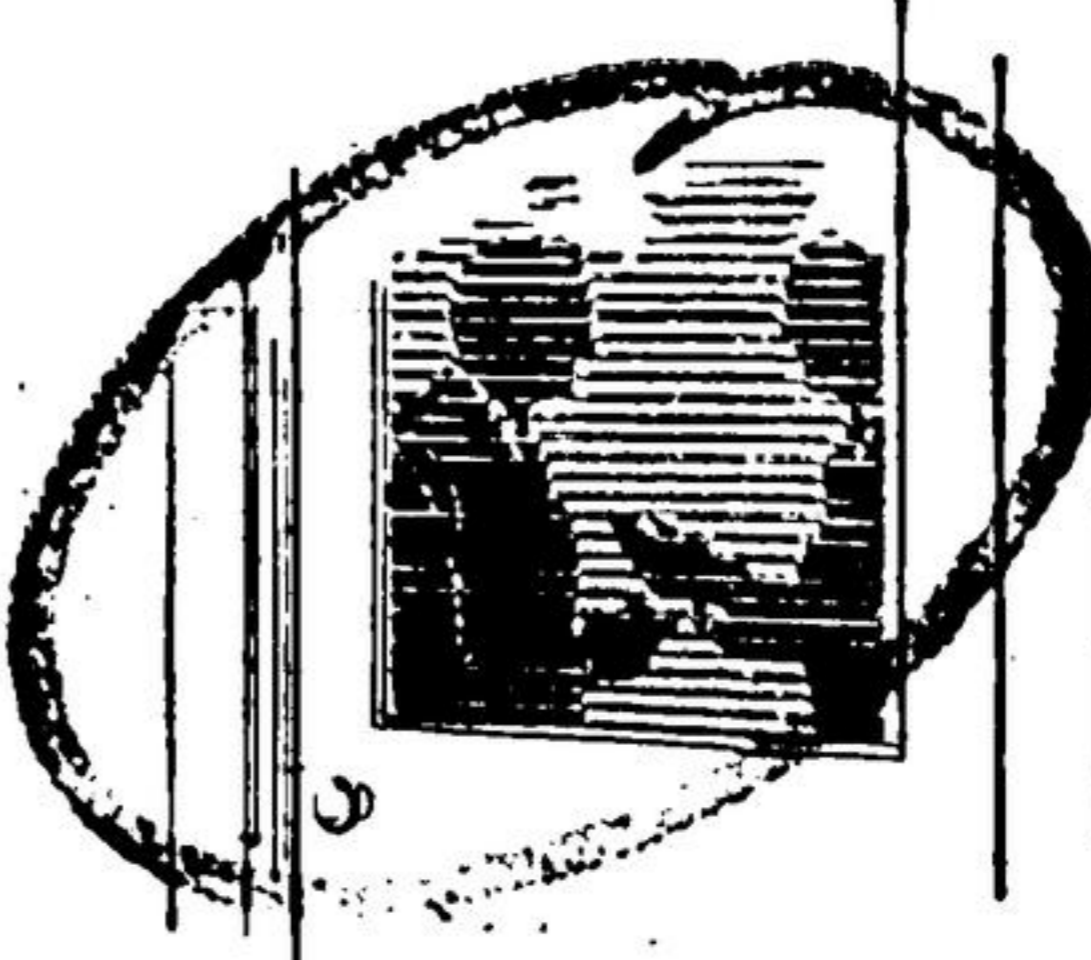
