Eight Years For Second Man In Bank Robbery

12th, 1949. He said he returned to Toronto from Montreal in response to a call from Mrs. Smythe who had a proposition in respect to her loan. He named men by the name of Friedman, Marco and Patrick as being present at her home. He said she wanted him to unload some bonds and make some money for himself. She gave him two \$100 bonds in payment of her \$40 loan. He also stated the only money he gave her was \$18 in payment for whiskey and beer purchased at her establishment.

Under cross examination by Mr. McCulloch, Burnell denied knowing a man by the name of Gauthier, but one by the name of Blair. He said he stayed at Blair's place two days after coming from Windsor. He also denied staying at the house when police found some of his luggage there. He explained a friend packed some of his things along with departure papers in his bag before they left Windsor, and it must have been his bag officers found. Witness admitted a record dating back to 1919.

Reviewing the evidence, his Honor declared there was no evidence before the court to show he was one of the three men who entered the bank on the day in question, but found the alibi evidence untrue.

"This court finds the accused was in the car used for the purpose of committing a robbery and is equally guilty with the other man. The four were engaged in one common purpose."

While Kryviatchuk was convicted on two previous occasions of armed robbery, he received twenty years when convicted on this charge.

Following a short recess, his Honor observed, "I have no hesitation in telling you, had you previously been convicted of an armed robbery, I would consider imposing a sentence the same as one of the others, 20 years. Your sentence must be long enough in an effort to keep you and others from this life of crime."

A stellar net-minding job by Gearing, in the Orono nets, repulsed their best attempts to hit the sheet.

Ray West paced the winners with three goals, one in each period while Gibson notched a singleton. Vaughan picked up both Acton tallies.

A last period bid by the Redmen was turned aside by Gearing Rusk had had luck on two of the goals racked against him. One was scored from an offside while the other feebly rebounded in after scorching off Strang's paraphernalia.

A sizeable crowd from Acton contributed to a figure of 1200 spectators in the edifice.
