Clerk was instructed to ask a representative of this industry to be present at the next meeting to discuss this matter with council.

A letter was received from F. L. Wright regarding the proposal at the last meeting to divide the insurance commissions on town insurance among local representatives.

Mr. Wright felt that, should such a commission be divided it should be on the basis of the taxation of the agent. Council filed the letter.

The arrangements of insurance companies to remunerate the municipality for out of town fire attended was presented by several companies in communications received.

Approval was granted by council on the request of Hill Telephone, for further improvements in this company's system within the municipality.

Material was presented and discussion followed on the suggested purchase of a new auxiliary pump and extensions at the pump house.

Clerk McGeechie was to instruct the Chief of Police to enforce the fire by-law by arranging for proper protective lighting on building material left on the street overnight.

Discussion followed and the necessary arrangements to be made for a hook up on the Town truck and the reels bearing extra hose in the event of a large fire in the Municipality.

Council adjourned from their lengthy session at 1:45 a.m.

The Letter Box

To the Editor of the Acton Free Press.

The following item from a Toronto daily paper would indicate the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission is negotiating for a site for a steam power plant at Windsor, Windsor, Ont., March 19-(CP)-

As expropriation proceedings of the Yawkey estate continue, estimates become lower for the 75-acre tract of land on the Detroit river.

Yesterday, W. H. Bosley, Toronto real estate broker, priced it at \$180,000. Thursday two realtors gave respective prices of \$347,500 and \$297,500. The owners claimed Wednesday the land is worth \$248,950.

The Ontario Hydro-Electric Power commission seeks the site for a proposed \$21,000,000 steam power plant, which would serve western Ontario.

If the Commission really wanted to serve its Hydro customers I think it would drop expropriation proceedings for such an expensive site and seek a tract of unimproved land that could be purchased for a few thousand dollars. When we read of the large expenditures contemplated for steam generating plants we must begin to take heed of what is to be the future of hydro as we knew it a few years ago.

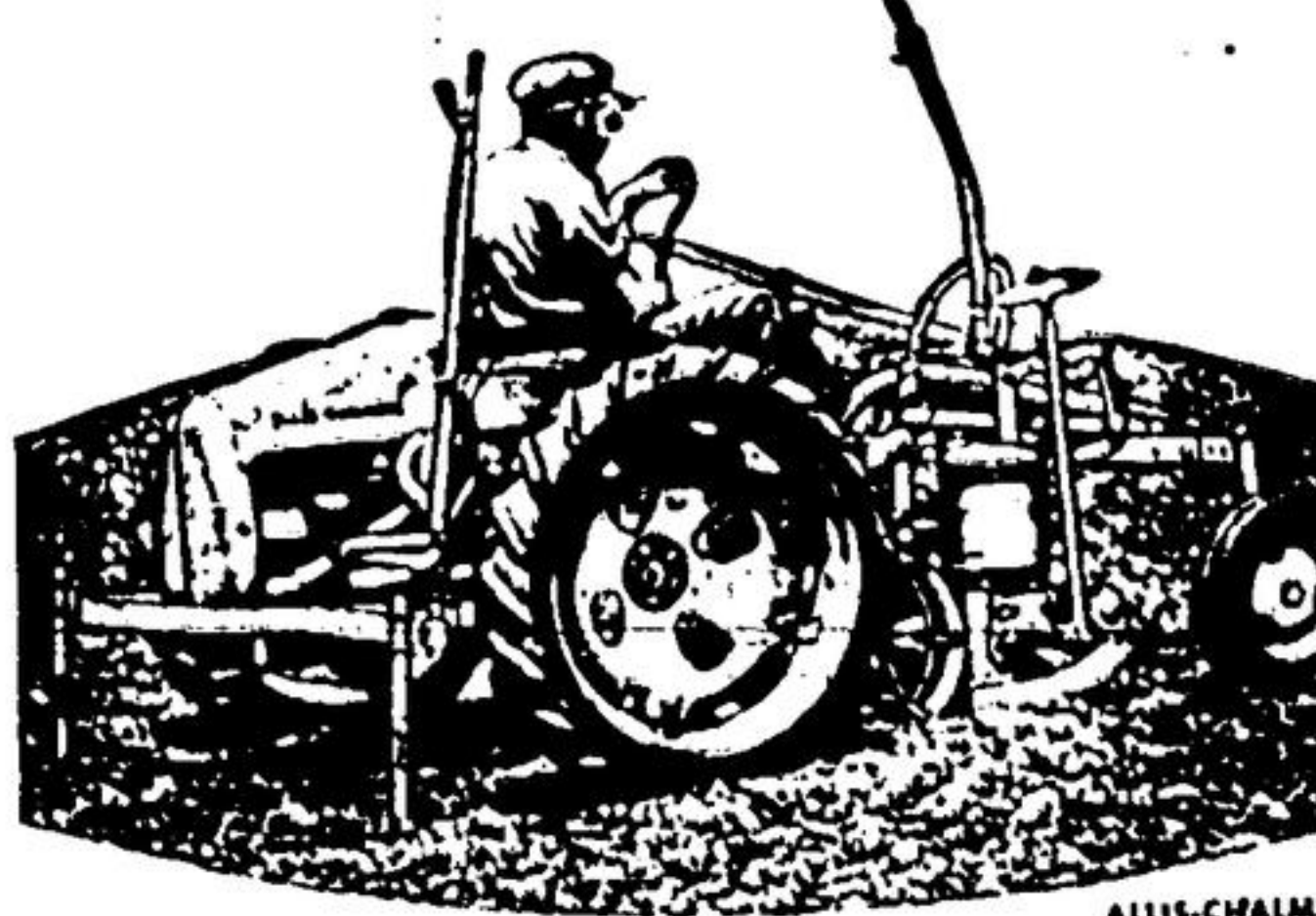
