Halton County Takes Ownership Lowville Park

McLaren. Halton Music Festival was given a grant of \$100.

Council was reminded the May meeting would consist of the annual visit of school children to the Council. Members approved of conducting an essay contest, "My visit to County Council," the essay to be not more than 300 words and to close at the end of the month. Ten prizes ranging from \$10 to one dollar would be paid to winners of the best essays.

Warden Mrs. Mary Pettit and Reeve VanSickle were appointed Council's representatives to the Halton Children's Aid Society.

In ordering a communication from the Paed Registered Nurses' Association asking spending money be given to the inmates of the Home for the Aged to be filled, it was explained \$200 a month was now being given to those at the home, from their pension money. Madame Warden said this money could be spent as the individuals see fit for their own pleasure.

Outlining the proposed program of the County Roads departments, Roy Smith, engineer, said expenditures were estimated at \$163,000 for the year. He said increased costs in maintenance attributed to the slight increase. The program included widening of roads and elimination of dangerous curves on some roads he said.

Mr. Smith told members industry was providing health and life insurance service to their employees and suggested it might be an excellent plan to study for the benefit of county employees. Council instructed the Finance Committee to investigate all phases of this service and report their findings at a later meeting.

Col. John R. Barber, commanding officer of Lorne Scots Regiment was present to thank Council for their recent donation to the Regimental Band and Regiment.

Council approved a resolution sponsored by Reeves Biggar and VanSickle asking the Department of Transport to make a change of the signal system at the crossing at Campbellville. They said the present mechanism was obsolete and should be replaced by more modern equipment as soon as possible.

Warden Mrs. Pettit on behalf of Council expressed their sympathy to County W. H. Biggar during his bereavement over the loss of his wife.

Expenditures approved and ordered to be paid included: County Buildings \$355.38; Agriculture and Reforestation \$502.26; Hospital accounts \$1,025.00; Printing \$36.14; County Roads \$7,740.29; Finance \$3,882.39; Assessment Committee \$7.43.

Council adjourned to meet May 19th.

County Council to Investigate a Halton Home

Will Make Preliminary Survey of Subject and Appoint A Committee

"That's the best news I've heard today," beamed Warden Mrs. Mary Pettit when Halton County Council decided to conduct a preliminary survey for the purpose of instituting a new Home for the Aged in Halton County.

Council approved a resolution sponsored by Reeve John T. Armstrong and Deputy Reeve James Goodlet, "that a committee be appointed consisting of Deputy Reeve Goodlet, Reeve Chambers and Reeve Jiggins to formulate plans for a new Home in Halton County."

Discussion of Halton establishing a Home of their own arose when Reeve Armstrong enquired of the Warden whether or not the subject had been mentioned at a recent meeting of the Board of Governors of the jointly owned Home.

The possibility of a new home was discussed at a former meeting of council when they approved of bearing their share of the cost of construction of a new wing at the Brampton home. Members felt while a most friendly co-operation existed between the two counties, Halton was being asked to contribute to expenses in remodeling an old building. Others felt money spent by Halton for this purpose could be used toward building of modern construction of their own.

Assured by Madame Warden that no discussion had taken place, Reeve Armstrong declared there was a feeling by many people in the county the time had come for Halton to make plans to establish their own Home.

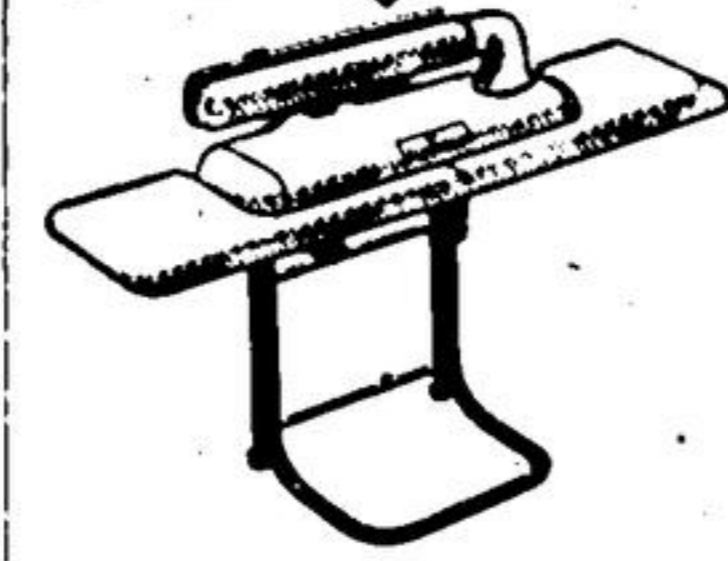
"If such thoughts existed, now would be the time for us to take action," observed Madame Warden as other members gave their approval to her suggestion. Reeve Jones, Acton, told members he had given the project some thought since the last meeting and had taken the liberty to copy plans which he would later present to the council. "These may be of some assistance to us," he stated.

Referring to proposed expenditures of providing the Home with Brampton sewerage service at an estimated cost of some \$25,000, Reeve Armstrong observed, "this looks to me to be only the start of spending money over there, above what we have already approved of. Then we still have an old building."

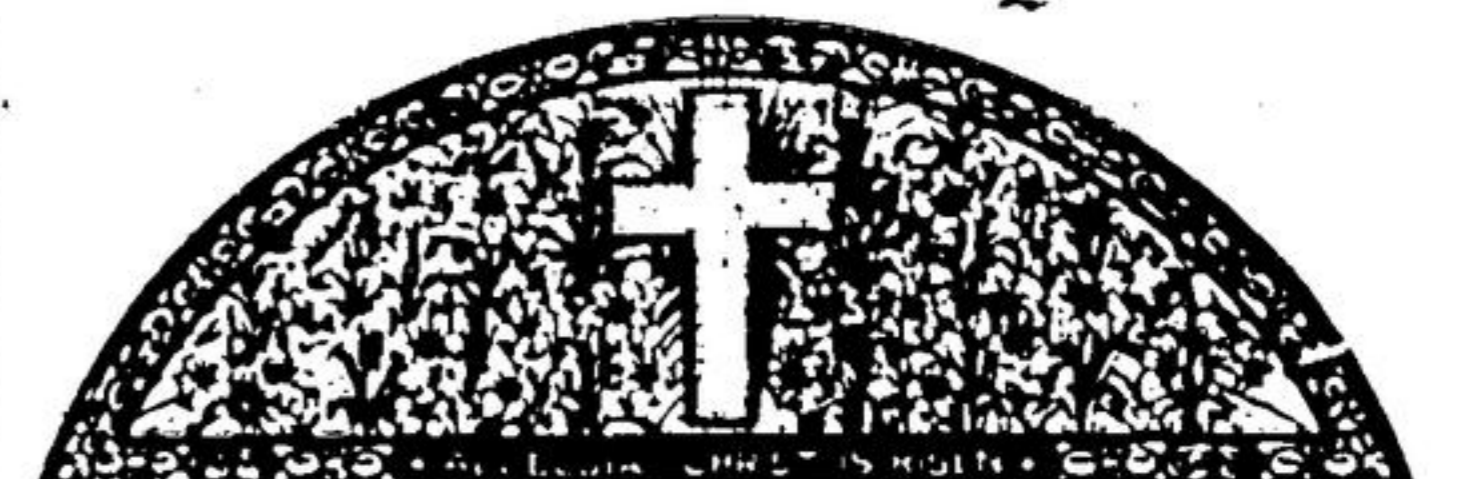
