W. Bert Shane C. C. F. Nominee for Halton County

Nomination Meeting Held Last Night in Milton Theatre When Four Are Nominated

W. "Bert" A. Shane of Oakville was chosen to contest Halton riding at the Federal election being held June 27th, at the C.C.F. Convention held at the Princess Theatre in Milton last night. Three other names were placed before the Convention, but withdrew in favour of the candidate. They were Mrs. Marjorie Finney, Burlington, Ar. basic Services, Milton, and W. E. Adamson, defeated C.C.F. candidate during the last provincial election. A fruit and vegetable grower, Mr. Shane was formerly associated with the Canadian Broadcasting Co., stationed at Hornby transmitter. During the war he was radar consultant with the American forces before returning to his Oakville farm.

Criticizing both Liberal and Conservative parties, he told the small audience they had done nothing to increase the purchasing power of the individual in Canada. "We don't offer excuses or promises, but we are the only party with a definite program," he stated, adding that the C.C.F. would also nationalize our banks. They would operate in our communities just as they do now with the same personnel, but with a policy to serve the people of Canada. Questioned about his party's stand on the margarine question, Mr. Shane stated the manufacture of this product would be done by a crown company and any profits made would be used to subsidize the dairy industry if necessary.

Is there any connection of the C.C.F. with that of the Communist Party? questioned a member of the audience at the rear of the theatre. "That can be answered in one word, None," declared W. E. Adamson, jumping to his feet. "There have been a lot of charges made but the Communist Party is fighting us tooth and nail, opposing us wherever possible."

E. B. Joffile, Provincial Candidate of the C.C.F. was scheduled to have been guest speaker, but was unable to make an appearance. The Chairman Adamson assured the delegates Mr. Joffile had promised to come to Milton, but must have met with urgent business which detained him.

In declining to allow their names to go before the committee, Mr. Adamson said "I thank you all, but decline the nomination at this time." Mrs. Service "While I am interested in the affairs of the C.C.F. Party, I have no political aspirations," Mrs. Finney. "At the present time my place is with my children."
