Milton Citizen and Industrialist Killed By Train**Passenger Train Travelling 50 Miles Per Hour—Death**

By Fractured Skull

A well known industrialist and prominent Milton citizen, Sam Smith, 63, owner of the Model Knitting Mills, at Toronto and Milton, was instantly killed in a level crossing accident here yesterday morning.

Mr. Smith was on his way from the Court Street plant to interview his bank manager when the accident happened. According to investigating officers, he was crossing the C.P.R. level crossing east of his plant, on the Second Line Trafalgar township, when his vehicle was hit directly in the centre of the right side by an east-bound C.P.R. passenger train at 9:45 a.m. Mr. Smith was thrown clear of his vehicle about 150 feet from the point of impact, while the car was dragged another 80 feet. Dr. George R. Syer, Coroner was called to the scene of the accident. He pronounced death caused by a fractured skull.
